Meet your 2023-2024 AAA Executive Committee

President: Frank Busso Jr has served on the AAA board of directors since 2007 and as the organization's 2nd Vice President since 2021. He is the director of the Ernest Deffner Affiliates, whose brands include Titano, PANcordion, Pigini, Excelsior, Roland, and Hohner. Frank is the accordionist for The United States Air Force Band in Washington, DC and runs the Busso Music School in Alexandria, VA. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration from Boston University, later serving as an instructor and arranger with the Boston University Athletic Bands. Frank studied accordion with Frank Busso Sr at the Staten Island Music School in New York, eventually becoming an instructor there, where his students earned many regional and national titles in competition.



1st Vice President: Frank Busso Sr has served on the governing board of the American Accordionists' Association for over 45 years. He has held the offices of President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, and Treasurer. Frank started studying and playing accordion at age 7. Since then, he has achieved great successes as a performer throughout the New York metropolitan area. As director of the Staten Island Music School in New York, Frank taught many award-winning students and conducted numerous classical & festival accordion orchestras. He was also the music teacher at two parochial schools for over 25 years. Currently a resident of northern Virginia and Palm Beach, Florida, Frank continues to perform and arrange orchestral works.



2nd Vice President: Sam Falcetti graduated from the University of Hartford with a degree in Theory & Composition. In the 70s and 80s, he was an adjunct professor at Westfield State University and Holyoke Community College, where he had an accordion ensemble that twice performed at Carnegie Hall. As a conductor, Sam's Springfield Accordion Orchestra was invited to perform at the World's Fair in Osaka, Japan and also toured Italy performing concerts. As an entrepreneur, he founded Falcetti Music, a 60-year eight-store music chain in both Massachusetts and Connecticut. Today, Sam is involved in teaching over 30 digital accordion players at Falcetti Music and online. He is also a Roland V-Accordion dealer and conducts the 20-member New England Digital Accordion Orchestra, performing at major events in Massachusetts and Connecticut. Sam is a past president and charter member of the Accordion Teachers Association of Massachusetts, an honorary member of the Massachusetts Accordion Association, and a past officer and member of the AAA since the 70s. In 2019, he was awarded the first International Scholar Award at the "IDEAS Symposium" in Ohio.



Secretary: Rita Davidson Barnea is an honors graduate of the University of Connecticut, having received a Bachelor of Science degree in Music Education, and has been a member of the AAA board for many years. For over 14 years, Rita has served as the national editor of accordionusa.com, covering accordion artists, concerts, and other events taking place in North America. Nathan Chapeton: Luncheon Concert Performer



Nathan is a university student and musician who became interested in playing the accordion at the age of eight when he heard his teacher, Mary Tokarski perform in concert. He has appeared as a guest artist for many local musical organizations, including the Long Island Accordion Alliance, the Brooklyn Accordion Club, and as a frequent performer at Connecticut Accordion Association events. Nathan has earned the privilege of representing the United States-AAA at the Coupe Mondiale (World Accordion Championships) several times including in Russia, Austria, Lithuania, and China. Nathan was among participants from around the globe to perform at the 2018 First Honors Recital at Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall in New York City, where he performed Alexander Tcherepnin's "Partita." Nathan has also appeared as guest soloist with both the New Haven Symphony and the Hamden Symphony Orchestra in Connecticut.

Joanna Darrow: Conductor of AAA Junior Festival Orchestra, Westmont Philharmonia Accordion Orchestra, and Westmont Accordion Club

Joanna Arnold is the personal protégé of Stanley Darrow. During her studies at the Acme Accordion School, she covered all aspects of musical training, specializing in music of the Baroque period and chamber music. Joanna has studied with Guy Klucevsek, and also composition and analyses with Dr. E. Avril. Performing in conjunction with bassoon, harp, harpsichord, strings, and piano, she has brought the accordion to the attention of local professional musicians and to members of the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra, for which she now serves as staff accordionist. Joanna is Director of the Westmont Philharmonia Accordion Orchestra and serves as a member of the Board of Directors of the AAA, Accordionists and Teachers Guild International (ATG), and A World of Accordions Museum. She has also been



appointed adjunct accordion instructor for accordion majors at Rowan University in Glassboro, New Jersey.

"Papa Joe" De Clemente: Workshop Presenter

"Papa Joe" started playing the accordion in 1956 at the young age of nine. He was interested in playing because he used to visit his relatives, the Iorio's, who manufactured accordions in New York City as far back as 1907. Joe has performed in numerous venues and loves to entertain people. He volunteers weekly to assist an elementary school music program at Public School 203Q in Bayside, Queens, which is one of the only elementary schools in New York City with a student accordion band. Joe shares: "To me, music has been a language that crosses all barriers, speaking to all people and bringing joy to those who listen. The box has been my pal for over 60 years and I am glad the Lord gave me this special gift.



Dee Langley: Workshop Presenter and Conductor of AAA Beginner Adult Band



Dee specializes in both solo and ensemble works for the accordion, having appeared with the Minnesota Orchestra, St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, Guthrie Theater, Nautilus Music Theater, Ethnic Dance Theatre, and Theater Latte Da. She won the 2012 Minnesota Emerging Composer Award (Orkestar Bez Ime - World Music), the 2011-2012 McKnight Fellowship for Performing Musicians. In 2019, Dee was honored at the American Accordion Musicological Society (AAMS) for her lifelong dedication and service to the accordion as a performer, educator, director, and composer. She was inducted into the American Accordion Hall of Fame in 2020. Founder and coordinator for the NE Accordion Festival, Dee is also a past president of the Accordionists and Teachers Guild International (ATG) and currently teaches accordion for Minneapolis College, as well as privately in NE Minneapolis.

Grayson Masefield: Gala Concert Performer, Luncheon Concert Performer, and Workshop Presenter

Born in Auckland, New Zealand, Grayson is the first person to win world championships in classical, virtuoso, and digital accordion categories. He is the Instrumental Music Teacher for Accordion at the University of Auckland and is the founder of AOTANGO. Grayson studied in France with Frederic Deschamps, earned a Master in Specialised Music Performance degree at HEMU Lausanne, Switzerland with Stephane Chapuis, and completed a Masters of Studio Pedagogy degree from the University of Auckland. He is regularly invited to adjudicate and/or appear as Guest Artist at international competitions he has previously won. At the 2010 Coupe Mondiale in Croatia, Grayson was elected to the prestigious CIA Music Committee and is currently its Vice-Chairman.



Grayson's extensive repertoire, including concert works and entertainment selections, can be heard on his three albums and in many live performances available on YouTube. He has worked with several of the world's leading composers, such as Frank Angelis (France), Gorka Hermosa (Spain), Petri Makkonen (Finland), and Gary Daverne (New Zealand) to perform and record new original works for the accordion.

Dr. Robert Young McMahan: Workshop Presenter



Dr. McMahan is an accomplished accordionist and author, specializing in contemporary music, assisting composers, presenting workshops, and performing premieres of new accordion works. In recent times, he presented an educational workshop, "Radio Days Accordion: A Sampling of Once Popular Accordionist Composers of the Past and an Examination of their Music," which included accordion duet performances by Dr. McMahan and Albert Schlisserman of "The Rooster," by Joe Biviano and "Allegro," by Gene Von Hallberg. On the literary front, Dr. McMahan has written numerous articles, including an in-depth analysis of many of the works commissioned by the AAA's Composers Commissioning Committee. In addition, he wrote and collaborated with noted American composer and author of "The Study of Orchestration," Samuel Adler, in creating the first entry ever of the accordion in the Keyboard Instruments chapter of the new 4th edition, published in 2016.



Joey Miskulin: Gala Concert Performer and Workshop Presenter

Joey is the first accordionist to be inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame. His 2018 induction into the "Nashville Cats" is the highest accolade given to a very select few recording session musicians. The Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum's Nashville Cats series spotlights musicians and session singers who have played important roles in country music history, and his award ceremony highlighted the hundreds of albums he recorded with some of music's greatest names that, to date, resulted in over 100 million sold. The Garth Brooks album where Joey was featured using his PANcordion has reached over 50 million in sales! He is the tenth recipient of the AAA Lifetime Achievement Award.



Joey is extolled nationally as accordionist, arranger, spontaneous improviser, studio musician, pedagogue, and unequalled entertainer. In a music career spanning more than four

decades, Joey has collaborated with a range of artists including Paul McCartney, John Denver, Ricky Skaggs, Andy Williams, Ricky Van Shelton, Emmylou Harris, Frankie Yankovic, Garth Brooks, and many others. Although principally known as a superb performer, his talents extend to many production credits that include Disney/Pixar in Toy Story, and recently in Shanghai, China, where he spent two weeks working with the Walt Disney Company.

Joey toured the United States with Frankie Yankovic as his featured accordionist for six years, writing and arranging songs between performances. In the 1990s, he joined Riders In The Sky, and with them is billed as "Joey the Cowpolka King." This wholesome Western-style group brings smiles, laughter, and excellent musicianship to every audience.

Joan Cochran Sommers: AAA Festival Orchestra Conductor



Joan was awarded the title of Professor Emerita upon her retirement from the University of Missouri - Kansas City Conservatory of Music, where she established and taught the accordion degree program for 40 years. She has arranged innumerable works for accordion orchestra over many years, often for the UMKC Accordion Orchestra, which, under her direction won more first prizes than any other American group. Joan taught numerous accordionists over many decades, many who went on to distinguish themselves as artists, competition winners, and music professionals.

In both 1955 and 1956, she earned the right to represent the USA in the Coupe Mondiale, and it was those experiences that opened her eyes to the tremendous opportunities available to accordionists; perhaps it also fixed her lifelong interest in worldwide accordion activities. Joan is the founder of the CIA World Accordion Orchestra, which has presented concerts and premieres

in many countries around the world.

Joan has held positions in several music organizations, including the Accordionists and Teachers Guild International (ATG) and the Confédération Internationale des Accordéonistes (CIA-IMC-UNESCO), where after her retirement, she was unanimously awarded the status of CIA Honorary Member. Today she enjoys guest conducting accordion orchestras around the world, making new arrangements, and leading the UMKC Community Accordion Ensemble in frequent performances. She is the seventh recipient of the AAA's prestigious Lifetime Achievement Award.

Mario Tacca: Gala Concert Performer

Mario Tacca was born in Italy. During his childhood, his family moved to the Alsace Lorraine region of France, where he began his musical studies. This is where his love and intense desire to play the accordion began. He loved the sound! He would pick up the accordion and imitate some of the songs his mother used to sing. The desire and love never diminished, despite having to walk three miles weekly to his teacher with his instrument strapped to his back! While in France, he was the winner of many regional and national accordion competitions. He went on to become a world champion, winning the World Cup of Italy, the Grand Prix of Paris, the US National Competition, and the International Accordion competition held at Carnegie Hall in New York City. Always dazzling his audiences around the world, Mario is the eighth recipient of the AAA Lifetime Achievement Award.





Mario Tacca and Mary Mancini: Pasta Night Performers

Internationally acclaimed vocal artist Mary Mancini has been featured in the New York Times, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, and the Journal News and has performed in a variety of venues around the world. Able to sing in eight different languages, Mary draws from a deep repertory reservoir. She is adept at pop, showtunes, operatic arias, and sacred music and has received worldwide acclaim. Mary has headlined numerous concert halls and festivals in North America, Europe, and China, and has performed at the Garden State Arts Center, Resorts International Casino Hotel, Taj Mahal in Atlantic City, and Mohegan Sun Resort Casino in Connecticut.



Accordionist Mario Tacca is a multiple International and National Competition winner, a prolific composer, teacher, recording artist, and dedicated AAA governing board member

for many years. As a duo, the husband-and-wife team have performed together for over 40 years, sometimes clocking up as many as 200 concerts in a season. Dynamic entertainers, they engage audiences with musical genres that span classical, pop, gospel, and traditional music from Italy and France. As a popular performing duo, Mary and Mario have completed two concert tours of China.

Accordion Pops Orchestra: Gala Concert Performers



The Accordion Pops Orchestra traces its roots to 1970 and its first director, Dr. Jacob Neupauer. After performing under well-known directors, including Eugene Ettore and Daniel Desiderio, the orchestra has performed under the baton of Al Terzo since 2011. With members from numerous states in the northeastern US, the orchestra consists entirely of accordions, complemented by percussion. The 30 members include professionals, teachers, and amateur musicians. The orchestra performs a repertoire taken from a wide range of musical categories, including Broadway, popular, movie themes, and light classical. It performs in concert halls, festivals, playhouses, clubs, churches, and retirement homes.

Conductor Al Terzo is a music teacher, arranger, and conductor. He has been a member of the orchestra since its inception in 1970. In addition to serving on the AAA governing board, Al is a member of the Music Teachers National Association, the New Jersey Music Teachers Association, and the National Association of Music Educators.

The United States Air Force Strolling Strings: Gala Banquet Performers

The Air Force Strings is the official string ensemble of the United States Air Force. Stationed in Washington, DC, it is one of six musical ensembles that form The US Air Force Band. The Air Force Strings consists of 16 active-duty musicians performing a wide range of musical styles, from classical symphonic selections and Broadway show tunes to classic rock, bluegrass, and patriotic. The ensemble often entertains audiences at high-level military and government events in a formation known as the Strolling Strings, which includes Senior Master Frank Busso Jr on accordion. Providing a multi-dimensional experience, the instrumentalists surround the audience and perform from memory.

The U.S. Air Force Band's mission is to HONOR those who have served, INSPIRE American citizens to heightened patriotism and service, and CONNECT with the global community on behalf of the US Air Force and the United States. The excellence demonstrated by the Air Force Strings reflects the excellence displayed by all

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
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Two Years of AAA Virtual Competitions

The American Accordionists' Association celebrates 85 years!



What Events Led to the Formation of the American Accordionists' Association?

"When the musical history of our times comes to be written, one chapter will stand head and shoulders above all others in point of interest and importance, and that chapter will deal with the growth of the accordion movement during the last four years!"

—Accordion News, October 1937

When one reflects on the 1930s, two things immediately come to mind: the Great Depression and the emergence of the radio. By 1932, the radio dominated mass media throughout the industrial nations.

The piano accordion, still in its infancy, had been a huge hit in Vaudeville for many years. The accordions in the 1920s were filled with rhinestones and other ornamentation to "wow" the Vaudeville show audiences. When radio became the rage - a new, inexpensive form of entertainment at a time when money was scarce - Vaudeville simply died out.

The Vaudeville accordion stars were soon hired by the radio stations. By the late 1930s, one could hear accordions playing on the live radio programs all over the country. Many of the founders of the AAA performed weekly on the radio (these founders all worked in New York City):

- Charles Magnante: CBS, NBC four programs weekly
- Pietro Frosini: WOR, "John Gambling's Musical Clock" - daily except Sunday
- John Gart: WJZ four programs weekly
- Joe Biviano: NBC, WOR, CBS three programs weekly
- Charles Nunzio: WOR three programs weekly

While long distance calls to other accordionists were pretty much unheard of, and long letters were few and far between, musicians from all over the US and Canada would meet annually in Chicago for the Music Trades Convention, where discussions on "everything accordion" would take place day and night. The performers and educators listed above were busy arranging music for the radio programs, plus they were teaching, performing outside of the studios, composing solos and band pieces for accordion, and writing accordion instruction books.

Yet, these five men, along with seven other giants in the music world (all from the New York area) -- Pietro Deiro, City Anthony Galla-Rini, **Byron** Streep, Sidney Dawson, Abe Goldman, Gene Von Hallberg, Rowland and Sam were about passionate the instrument they had grown to love master: the accordion. Sam Rowland, who had founded the American Drummers' Association, suggested they form a new national organization for the accordion, headquartered in New York City. Thus, the American

Accordionists' Association was established, holding its first meeting on March 9, 1938.

Why create this organization? The ideas were flowing and excitement was at an all-time high for the new instrument. "What can we do to make the accordion boom last?" was asked and discussed at each meeting. First on the agenda was to develop standards of notation for the bass in sheet music for the accordion. Up until this time, some composers wrote the basses in treble clef, some used full chords, some used numbers for chords, while others used letters, and so on. The AAA Standardized Notation, using one note for chords with letter designations, was created and

was required for all accordion music printed in the US. The AAA founders, along with a rapidly growing group of new members, recognized the need for more original music for the accordion, better instruction and instructional manuals, and, most of all, they were determined to elevate the status of the piano accordion in the music world to that of a serious instrument.

The first AAA president, Pietro Deiro (known as the "Daddy of the Accordion") lectured and wrote articles for music publications such as Metronome, Etude Magazine, and the Accordion World for decades. Charles Magnante, Sidney Dawson, Anthony Galla-Rini, and Joe Biviano also wrote for these publications regularly with topics from "How to be a better radio accordionist" to "Accordions in public schools." Many excellent articles by these founders can be found in the aforementioned publications from the 1930s and early 1940s.

So many of the early pioneers in the AAA dedicated their entire lives to this instrument and worked tirelessly and passionately for the advancement of the



accordion. While many of the concerns we, in the AAA, have to this day about the acceptance and popularity of the instrument are the same as they were in the 1930s, one thing remains the same and likely always will: the versatile accordion is intensely loved and cherished by those who play it!




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New Directions for the Ongoing Historical and Analytical Series of Articles on the AAA's Commissioned Concert Works

It has been quite a while - four years, to be exact - since we last gathered in person for the much anticipated, uniquely eclectic, and always exciting annual mid-summer event the accordion world knows as the AAA Festival. During our difficult time of solitude, cautious mask-wearing and nervous coping with new "realities" in practically every aspect of daily life, many of our past patterns of thinking and acting changed to a considerable degree. This, my series on the history and analysis of the AAA's commissioned contemporary concert repertoire, was affected in certain ways as well by this upheaval of normalcy. This said, however, we often hope that change, pleasurable or not, will lead to something better, and I believe such did happen for this ongoing, multi-year project chronicling and examining the commissioned works and activities of the AAA's Composers Commissioning Committee, founded by Elsie Bennett in the mid-1950s.

To review, in 1997 I elected to launch a series of articles on the history and general analysis of every AAA commissioned work, starting with the first in 1957, Paul Creston's solo *Prelude and Dance*. These writings were to appear, one by one, every year in the annual AAA Festival's membership print publication *AAA Festival Journal*. And so they did across the next 21 years.

The first issue, in 1997, gave a brief (but soon to be greatly expanded) historical overview of the AAA Composers Commissioning Committee. The next 21 articles were spread across every year from 1998 through 2019, excepting 2007 when our organization was busy preparing to co-host the Coupe Mondiale in Alexandria, Virginia. Each one discussed one to four of the compositions, following the chronological order in which they were contracted by its chairlady. I decided to organize this string of writings in this way rather than by composer or style of composition to make the entire project a single ongoing history, delivered annually in serialized segments. As of my latest writing, which appeared in the 2019 issue of the *Journal*, I had reached the 34th and 35th commissions, the solos *Fables*, by William Schimmel, and *Scaramouche*, by John Franceschina, both of which were commissioned in 1974. Then came COVID.

Because of the pandemic, the Festival, along with the publication of its journal and hence this series of articles, reluctantly went dark for three years out of an abundance of caution. However, the lights are back on now, the 2023 Festival is in full swing, and the *Journal* is back in print,

carrying with it the possibility of resuming this series of articles. Regarding the last point, however, and as alluded to at the beginning of this writing, some things have changed, and in my opinion not only for the better but in some ways by necessity as well. To explain, excluding for the moment the assumption and fervent hope that more compositions will be commissioned by the AAA in the near as well as ongoing future, there remains on the present list 27 existing ones I must revisit for historic and analytical expansion. Even if an average of two such compositions are featured in each annual article in the *Journal* starting now, the task would not be concluded until the year 2037.

AAA Commissioned Works...continued

Considering all of the above and given that I am of a "mature" age, thus making it statistically chancy to assume that I will still be around and, if so, as active as I am presently near the end of this century's third decade, things need to be sped up so that I can produce and publish more than just one article per annum. The obvious solution, of course, is for me to write numerous articles back-to-back, as time and circumstances allow in these, my retirement years, across each entire year. This procedure, in fact, is already underway and was put into action in August of the second "dark year," 2021, but not initially for future articles but rather for the much-needed expansion of the past ones (to be described below). This action was set into motion largely by

the prompting and generous support of Harley Jones, creator and head of the all-important international accordion organization and website, Accordions Worldwide (accordions.com), who felt they should go viral in the worldwide accordion community. Progress on this project has, in fact, been going very well, thanks largely to Harley's generous contribution of countless hours spent gradually converting my texts into html format and putting them on the AAA website. Regular monthly reports on this ongoing project have been and will continue to be made in the Accordion USA section (accordionusa.com) of Accordions Worldwide. In addition, reports made prior to the current monthly issue may be easily found by clicking on "Previous News," appearing in the opening banner of Accordion USA. As of this writing, I have completed expansions of 18 of the 22 articles, which will be discussed and described in detail below.

My expansions of my past articles consist of 1) further historical research and reporting; 2) more extensive and detailed analyses of the works, including the new features of musical examples and occasional sound samples; and 3) additional photographs, most of which are from Elsie Bennett's extensive personal collection portraying commissioned composers (as well as many she visited who turned down commissions) and associated accordion artists, with all of whom she usually posed, in various locations either at their homes or at special events that usually, but not always, involved the accordion. Elsie was quite a documenter in both print and visuals and is affectionately remembered by all who knew her as an almost compulsive shutterbug, taking countless photos of every event, accordion-related or not, she attended, and generously mailing copies to her subjects afterwards. (Though an able typist, Elsie never employed the computer or internet in her work.)

The reader might wonder from reading the above description of this project how a sound sample can work within a printed article on paper. The answer is quite simple: These expanded articles are <u>not</u> in that format, but rather are or will be online within the AAA website in a special section dedicated to the commissioned works. To read those that are already there, please visit <u>ameraccord.com/aaacommissions.php</u>. I will, however, contribute a small article in future AAA Festival Journal print issues regarding the work of the previous year and announcing any other pertinent news regarding activities pertaining to them and the Composers Commissioning Committee.

In the meantime, enjoy browsing the Composers Commissioning homepage and, I hope, reading the articles!

AAA Commissioned Works...continued

In closing, the AAA can proudly count to date 62 works by a total of 38 composers who have produced one to four works each for our organization and artists over a period of 66 years. At least 17 of these composers are indisputably world renowned and will be found in every textbook on contemporary music; another 10 are highly respected, outstanding composers of less notoriety, but of high worth whose music is frequently performed and recorded; and many of the remaining numbers are classical-level accordionists of similar status who often hold advanced degrees in composition and high positions in academia and whose works for or including accordion as well as for other instruments and various ensembles have been widely performed, published, and recorded. It has been and continues to be my great pleasure and privilege to research and write

about all these outstanding composers' and performers' work and their great contributions to the accordion's contemporary classical repertoire.

It is my strong conviction that the release of these articles, recordings, and other CCC-related news and information from our accordion "village," large and international as it has gradually become over many decades, into the yet more diverse musical vastness of cyberspace in general will draw increasing attention from the classical music world at large, thus attracting more serious composers and concert venues to consider the accordion's possibilities and importance in contemporary music and for composers to write for it or include it in their instrumentation for chamber, orchestral, and operatic works (all of which has already happened to a considerable degree across the past century). These actions will also help to awaken many important and influential musical scholars who are major critics and authors to the rise of the accordion's presence in so many works by some of the most famous composers in the world (for example, Henry Cowell, Ernst Krenek, David Diamond, Samuel Adler, and Lukas Foss to name just a few among the AAA commissioned composers alone) to its growing significance and usefulness in these times.

For all the above reasons, the accordion has long deserved and by now certainly earned over its almost 200 years of technological evolution and ever growing inclusion in more and more advanced concert music the exalted status of what I like to term the "fourth keyboard instrument," fully deserving of joining in importance and usefulness its three historic predecessors, the piano, organ, and harpsichord, in their enormous contributions to the development and evolution of so many of the western world's musical masterpieces. All four have unique technical, timbral, and expressive qualities that lend themselves extremely well to music of all kinds, including that highest level we generally refer to as "classical." The AAA is among the earliest organizations to put into motion this upward climb of the accordion in advanced 20th and 21st century repertoire which now abounds in hundreds of solo, chamber, orchestral, and dramatic works for or including its presence worldwide. This is why its story must be often told and music for or including it widely and continuously created, published, publicized, promoted, disseminated, and frequently heard in both live and recorded performance. To these ends, the AAA is and has long been a tremendously important and deservedly proud and pioneering advocate and driver. May it long continue to be so and may my own small contributions to the movement, in addition to those of many others, past, present, and in the future, spur it on to many more and increasingly greater and more publicly heard successes.

Final idea and friendly request: I would like to propose that across this next year (and hopefully every year thereafter) accordionists anywhere in the world who have read this or previous articles in this series, or have not, but have heard from those who have and are interested in its cause to promote original contemporary concert music for our instrument, please report to me any performances they have given of AAA commissioned or other contemporary classical works for or including accordion so that I may list them in this annual journal and periodically online in Accordions Worldwide. AAA Congratulates Lifetime Achievement Award Recipient Frank Busso, Sr.

SPOTLIGHT on Frank Busso, Sr. – musician, educator, conductor and ambassador of the accordion

It is always difficult for me to find just the right opening words for my articles to set the tone I want to convey. This article was no different –until I received these beautifully expressed words of love and admiration from Frank's daughter, Christina Busso:



"My dad is my hero and, through the eyes of this adoring daughter, he is larger than life!

At some point, you realize that playing the accordion is a somewhat remarkable thing. But for me, growing up, I simply didn't know anyone who didn't play the accordion! It started with my dad as a role model, of course, and then extended to my uncles, family friends and scores of students in and out of the music school. It was therefore natural for me to begin taking lessons when I was four, and I was always so proud to be part of the music school. I loved when I was old enough to join the orchestra and so excited to have my dad as my conductor.

As my dad was also the music teacher at two schools in our area, it was not uncommon for me to hear in the local grocery store, 'Ohhh, you're MR. BUSSO'S daughter!?!' That was music to my ears. I could not have been prouder.

Now that I have my own children, I wasn't sure whether they would share the same love for music, and love for the accordion. Apparently, it must be in the genes! Alex (nine years old) has been playing since he was five, and Caroline (five years old) started lessons at age four. Nothing makes me happier than to see and hear them practice and to play alongside my dad, my brother, or me. Truly, it is a family affair.

When my brother first started conducting his own orchestra a few years ago, to some it may have seemed like a passing of the baton, but it was also him picking up his own melody. I recall in the first orchestra piece my brother conducted, I played alongside my dad and followed the lead of my brother, and watched my mother, my husband and our children in the audience. Somewhere in the middle of the piece, I nearly lost my place as I teared up.

Playing the accordion isn't a hobby – it is something that ties our family together across THREE generations – WOW."

And all of this because Frank's childhood home was too small for the piano that his mom had dreamed her son would learn to play. But there was room for an accordion, and the rest is history, and quite a delightful story of hard work, dedication and love that continues to this day.

Frank's Childhood

Frank, the only child of Constantino and Jeanette (Rapino) Busso, was born on Staten Island, New York in 1943. Tragically, his father died in World War II on the USS Ticonderoga in 1945, when Frank was just two years old. After his father's death, he and his mother moved into a three-room flat with Frank's grandparents.

When Frank was seven, he began taking accordion lessons from Prof. Omero Castellucci. An excellent European-trained accordionist, Castellucci encouraged young Frank to practice daily, and invited him to join his band. This band consisted of all instruments plus vocalists and met weekly above the local police station. They regularly put on shows for the community. Castellucci was also a composer. He composed and directed the world premiere of his opera, "The Prince of Peace" in 1955 at the Sailors Snug Harbor auditorium in Staten Island. Renowned musicians and singers performed in the orchestra and chorus... and one accordion player. So impressed with his 12 year old student's abilities, Castellucci wrote a solo part for Frank, which he performed in that world premiere.

Frank's mother remarried when Frank was seven years old, and they eventually moved to another section of Staten Island. It became difficult for Frank to get across town for his lessons, so when he was 14, his stepfather found him a new accordion teacher: Tony Ettore.

The Ettore School of Music was filled with "the sound of music", and Frank really enjoyed being there. Encouraged to enter competitions, Frank took 1st place two years in a row in his elementary school's music contest, and he won the American Accordionists' Association (AAA) US Senior A Solo Competition in 1963 at the age of 20. From 1959 to 1965, Frank won numerous national, regional and state accordion championships. The national and regional competitions were sponsored by the AAA, while the state championships were sponsored by the New York State Accordion Association.

With Tony Ettore's guidance, Frank started teaching at the Ettore School of Music at the age of 18 and soon had many private students. He also conducted ensembles and bands at the school.

Early on, Frank knew that his life would revolve around the accordion. He loved to play and bring joy to others through his music. At 13, he began performing for church groups and playing club dates in hotels including the Statler Hilton and the Biltmore. He also really enjoyed teaching, arranging and conducting. When he was 32 years old, Frank started his own band, "Rendezvous", which performed all over the NY metropolitan area for decades. But this was just a small part of Frank's activities and accomplishments.

While playing out several nights a week, Frank completed his college education. He holds a BS in Business from St. Peter's College and an MBA from Wagner College. This background helped him when he opened a music center, "Music City", which he eventually expanded to four locations in Staten Island. While running these stores, teaching accordion and playing club dates, Frank also

found time to meet, court and marry his lifetime partner, Carmela (Felitti) in 1975. And how did they meet? Through Carmela's brother, Gerald – an accordionist!

Carmela enjoys reminiscing about their first days together. "Frank and I started dating and as is true to this day, he always chose fine dining restaurants. After several evenings, I remember going home and telling my mother, 'It's like dating a movie star!' Due to his years of performing/entertaining and his music stores (Music City), he was well-known on Staten Island. People would come over to chat as well as simply point to him and whisper, loudly, 'That's Frank Busso!' I am still proud to be his date!"

New Ventures and Faithe Deffner's Influence

Faithe Deffner took a liking to Frank early on in his career. Faithe was highly respected for her fierce lifelong dedication to the accordion, the manufacturing of fine instruments, as well as her tireless involvement in the AAA and the international accordion scene. She admired Frank's energetic and successful efforts with his students, as well as his work ethic. Faithe also felt that he shared her desire to heighten interest in the accordion throughout the country at a time when the accordion's popularity was beginning to wane. Frank and Carmela took a tremendous liking to Faithe, and a close friendship blossomed which lasted until Faithe's passing in 2014.

Faithe's influence in Frank's professional life was immeasurable. In 1975 he owned and managed four music centers. "I wanted to get out of the business at this point in my life", Frank said. Faithe stepped in and, insisting that Frank was just what the young students and the accordion world needed, sent him to Les Ray in Florida to learn how to manage an accordion school. Frank returned to Staten Island, closed his four businesses and opened the "Staten Island Music School" in 1977. He and Carmela purchased a building on Main Street in Great Kills. The music studio was on the first floor and they lived upstairs. With Faithe's encouragement, Frank created a very successful

school which, at one time, had 175 accordion students. He sold accordions, his students and the bands repeatedly brought home trophies, and pretty soon he was teaching his own two children, as well.

Carmela speaks of those early years. "Christina and Frank, Jr. were both born in the same house where Frank gave music lessons and rehearsed his accordion bands. They were involved in attending and participating in at least three accordion festivals/competitions annually. As a result, I think they believed that everyone played the accordion! They learned to walk, talk and play the accordion."

Christina and Frank, Jr. loved their lessons with their father, and they loved being part of the music school's bands and orchestra. Both children were encouraged to learn other instruments. Christina played the flute and Frank, Jr. played the trumpet. Frank wrote arrangements that featured each of his children on these instruments in the accordion orchestra. It was delightful watching these young teens removing their accordions to begin their solos.

Peter Tripi began taking lessons from Frank in the late 1970s.

He was 12 years old when he began and he never left. He has been performing in the Busso Orchestras and Showbands for close to 40 years! One of his favorite performances of the Busso Music Showband was at the 2017 AAA Festival in Princeton, New Jersey, where Peter was as the band's vocalist. He still plays his accordion as well. Peter spoke glowingly of his teacher and friend. "Mr. B. was a very inspiring teacher. He taught us lifelong lessons such as how to work with others. He set a great example for all of his students."

Frank became the President of the Affiliated Accordionists of New York in 1971 and, with Faithe's encouragement and recommendation, became a member of the AAA Governing Board in 1973. He has been a member of the Governing Board for 45 years.

AAA Governing Board Positions

Frank has faithfully served the AAA as Treasurer, Vice President, President (1981, 1992-94) and also chaired many committees including the national festivals and the Young Artists Concert Series. He has held the position of the Comptroller of the AAA for many years.

Lana Gore, Frank Busso and former AAA President, Linda Soley Reed, were all born in the same year. These three

'comrades' joyfully met each year at all of the AAA competitions and festivals since they were teens. Linda reflects on these memories:

"I have known Frank, or I should say have known OF Frank, since I was eleven years old and attended my first AAA competition. Held at the Charles Evans Hughes High School in New York City, the competition for the eleven year olds had over 40 contestants. Fourteen of them came from my studio in Connecticut, but the 1st place winner was some 'kid from Staten Island' - Frank Busso. And there was another one who was always there: the 'kid That was Lana Gore. from Detroit'. There were no 4th place ribbons or ties, and certainly no 'attaboy' awards for just showing up. At 16, I finally won that coveted 1st place solo trophy, but the 'kid from Staten Island' wasn't there!!

The three of us baby boomers, Frank, Lana and Linda, became united again as adults, each with our own students competing and orchestras to conduct. And then we got involved with organizing events: Accordion Day, Eastern Cup, Summer Competitions and this became our lives. Encouraged by both Maddalena Belfiore and Faithe Deffner, we were soon AAA Governing Board members (Frank and I), then officers and committee chairs.

We were not only 'accordion friends' but real life friends, attending each others' 'special' birthdays, weddings, etc. Frank was so helpful to me when I realized that the accordion students started to dwindle and I decided to add a retail outlet to my then struggling teaching business. I drove down to Staten Island after teaching to pick up instruments and merchandise. We would go to dinner and talk about upcoming events and ideas for entertainment at each. We both held various offices in the AAA, but Frank was the one who got me through ten years of the Presidency of AAA. I would call him and say, 'What do you think of this...?', and in an instant he would give me all the pros and cons needed. I treasure his friendship and wisdom and hope this bond will continue for many years to come."

In addition to his many Board positions, the AAA festivals have benefitted from his years as Public Relations Chair, Festival Coordinator, Hotel Liaison, Conductor of the Massed Band and Conductor of the Festival Orchestra.

Music Teacher at three Parochial Schools on Staten Island

When Frank's daughter Christina was quite young, she recommended her dad when an organist was needed for a school production. Although he is not an organist, Frank played the organ for the event. Impressed with his abilities and his rapport with young children, Frank was asked to take over the music classes at the school. Frank accepted and was soon teaching 600 elementary school students at two parochial schools. A few years later, he was asked to teach 7th and 8th grade music students at a third school, and he accepted. Frank taught for a total of 27 years at these schools, while continuing to teach private accordion students and direct his bands and orchestras.

The Busso Trio and More

Impressed with Frank's children's abilities and their joyful "performance personas", Faithe Deffner suggested that Frank, with his children, create a performing trio with two piano accordions and a bass accordion. "The Busso Trio" was created and made its debut at the 2001 AAA Festival in Cleveland, Ohio to a very delighted audience. The trio still plays together as often as possible. Christina, married to Marshall Lammers, is now a mother of two and a lawyer working as the Executive Director of the Trial Lawyers Association of Washington, DC. She is delighted that her two children are study accordion with her brother Frank. Master Sergeant Frank Busso, Jr., now the accordionist with the

been studying since 2020. Hopefully we will be treated to a performance by "The Busso Octet" in the near future!

Frank, Jr., while busy with his young children and his two full-time jobs, is pleased to earn a living with the instrument that has meant so much to him his entire life. He attributes so much of what he has accomplished – and enjoys – to his father's influence. "I'm the first-call concert announcer for the Air Force Strings, and that's probably the case because I watched and learned from my father

serving as the master of ceremonies for countless concerts, recitals and award ceremonies." He also spoke about his outlook on his work versus that of many of his colleagues: "Having the opportunity to work with so many accomplished musicians, I've had colleagues who now look at music as their job, and they don't really get the same level of enjoyment out of performing as they did when they were younger. Just recently, I asked my father what motivates him, even after all these decades of performing, to take out the accordion to play for family holidays and engagements. Without hesitating, he said, 'To make people happy'."

Frank and Carmela retired and moved to Virginia in 2015 to be close to their children and grandchildren, and they winter in Florida. Of course, the accordion still plays a major role in their daily lives no matter where they hang their hats. "I am proud to be the sister, wife, mother and grandmother of accordionists!", Carmela beamed. Because of Frank's influence and the example he set, all of the Bussos are so proud to be a part of the accordion world, and the accordion world is very blessed to have the Bussos!

The popular, award-winning Showband is still going strong and is now under the direction of Frank, Jr. What a joy it is to watch father and daughter, along with many fine accordionists, play on stage as son Frank conducts the orchestra that his father founded so many years ago. At the last AAA Festival in Buffalo, New York, an extra special treat was seeing Christina's then eight year old son, Alexander, come up on stage for a duet with his friend as the orchestra accompanied them.
