

The Sad Passing of Alexander Sevastian

The music world was deeply saddened to learn that the Toronto-based accordion virtuoso Alexander Sevastian passed away on Friday, February 16, 2018 in Ajijic, Mexico while on tour with Quartetto Gelato.

Alexander was a renowned artist (accordion, piano, bandoneon), who won four International Accordion Competitions: the Oslofjord in Norway (1998), The Cup of the North in Russia (2000), the ATG Anthony Galla-Rini Accordion Competition in the US (2001) and The CIA Coupe Mondiale held in the US (2007) jointly hosted by the American Accordionists' Association (AAA) and the Accordionists and Teachers Guild, International (ATG). Born in Minsk, Belarus, he attended the Glinka Musical College (Minsk) and then pursued advanced studies at the Gnessin Academy of Music in Moscow where he received his Masters in Performance degree in 2002, studying with renowned performer and pedagogue, Friedrich Lips.

A previous guest of both the AAA and ATG, Alexander Sevastian began his professional career in Moscow in 1996, performing with the Russian Radio Orchestra, which he toured with as a soloist throughout Russia, Ukraine, Germany, Italy, and Japan. Highlights of his career include appearances in the Tchaikovsky Concert Hall, Glinka Capella Hall (St. Petersburg), Suntory Hall (Tokyo), Minato Mirai Hall (Yokohama), Roy Thomson Hall (Toronto), Jack Singer Hall (Calgary) and Metro-



politan Museum (New York). Recent solo engagements include recitals in Mexico, Italy, Portugal, Serbia, USA and Canada as well as appearances with many North American Symphony Orchestras.

Alexander Sevastian and his family moved to Canada in April 2001. After joining Quartetto Gelato in 2002, he completed the Advanced Certificate in Performance program at the University of Toronto where he studied with Joseph Macerollo. In April of 2008 he made his debut with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Peter Oundjian, playing the Malcolm Forsyth Accordion Concerto at the New Creations Festival, which he then performed with the orchestra on their 2009 tour of Eastern Canada.

Alex is survived by his wife Anya, their young children Vladimir (14) and Maria (4), his brother Vitali and his mother Nadya.

Over \$5,000.00 in cash awards and scholarships will be given out. The Festival averages more than 2500 entries. All events are free and open to the public.

ATAM President, Jay Latulippe from NH, is happy to announce that the ATAM will recognize Kevin Friedrich, internationally famous accordionist, concert artist, educator and adjudicator. The award will be presented at the Saturday evening annual awards banquet. This is a well deserved honor.

Kevin Friedrich

Born and raised in New Zealand, Kevin Friedrich began playing the accordion at the age of nine. After earning the title of New Zealand Solo Accordion Champion for two years Kevin moved to the United States to study accordion with Joan C. Sommers at the University of Missouri, Kansas City where he obtained his Bachelor of Music. He furthered his studies at the Conservatoire in Paris, France studying with CIA World Accordion Champion, Max Bonnay.

After serving as a Vice-President for eight years, Kevin served two four year terms as President of the Confédération

Internationale Des Accordéonistes (CIA), the umbrella organization for 43 countries and their National Accordion Associations and the voice of the accordion at the International Music Council, an NGO official partner of UNESCO. At the conclusion of his Presidency, Kevin was unanimously elected by the CIA Executive Committee to his current position of CIA Ambassador, a role created specifically for him.

Through his work as CIA Ambassador, Kevin travels to many International festivals around the world, often resulting in fascinating projects such as playing in the successful Guinness World Record event where 2,260 performers set the record for the largest accordion orchestra, held in Shenzhen, China on July 14, 2017. Kevin also enjoys working to preserve the history of the accordion. He established his own accordion museum in New Zealand and serves as Vice President of the world's largest accordion museum, A World of Accordions Museum in Superior, Wisconsin. Kevin was recently appointed President of the International World Accordion Museum Alliance (WAMA).

Kevin currently makes his home in New York City and serves on the Board of Directors for both the American Accordionists' Association (AAA) and the Accordionists and Teachers Guild, International (ATG). ■



The Long Island Accordion Alliance (LIAA)

La Villini Restaurant of East Northport, NY is sponsored the March meeting of the Long Island Accordion Alliance (LIAA) was held on March 7, 2018. The featured guest artists were accordionist Mario Tacca and vocalist Mary Mancini.

Dominic Karcic, organizer, stated that as a long time resident of Long Island and an active performing accordionist, he knew that there were many people who either played the accordion or used to play the accordion and that there was a vast group of people who just loved accordion music and it's culture. He always felt that there was a void and lack of activities and events for the accordion locally. Being a "dreamer," I have always felt that a periodic accordion event if structured properly would succeed. He started to bring his dream to reality when in July of 2010 I began calling various accordionists that he knew. Everyone that he contacted agreed to participate and the rest is history.

On August 3, 2010 the very first meeting of what today is known as the Long Island Accordion Alliance (LIAA) took place at a Commack, Long Island restaurant named Campagnola. This very first meeting included Joe Campo, John Custie, Charlie Fontana, Phil Franzese, Dominic Karcic, Emilio Magnotta, Ray Oreggia, Phil Prete, Franco Ruggiero and Mike Zeppetella. In January of 2011 we moved to our current home at La Villini Restaurant in East Northport, Long Island.

The Alliance, made up of both professional and amateur accordionists, meets once a month on the first Wednesday of the month with Alliance members performing solo, in small ensembles and as an orchestra. Every month we usually have a featured guest artist(s).

The LIAA is proud to periodically feature outstanding guest artists including Beverly Roberts Curnow, Mario Tacca and Mary Tokarski. Some other artists that have performed for us include Manny Corallo, Angelo DiPippo, Don Gerundo, Emilio Magnotta, Paddy Noonan, Frank Toscano, the Scandinavian group Smorgas Bandet and internationally acclaimed vocalist Mary Mancini. Patrons come in to have dinner and listen. Some patrons who play the accordion are invited and encouraged to participate in the "open mic" portion of the evening.

The LIAA aims to promote a love for the accordion and accordion music, bring former accordionists back to the instrument, create an environment where aficionados can attend and "celebrate the accordion and its culture." The LIAA strives to create a vehicle where accordionists can perform, grow musically, meet regularly, network and in our own way further the aims and goals of the American Accordionists' Association (AAA).

In the fall of 2015, Newsday paid a visit to the LIAA event and gave a tremendous two and one-half page write up. The article really boosted the LIAA event enabling a far greater and wider audience of accordion fans. In addition on January 3, 2018, the LIAA was honored by a visit by Dave Anthony Setteducati. Mr. Setteducati is the host of the "Italian America Long Island" Cablevision program which airs every Wednesday on channel 115.

This resulted in the event being videoed and the creation of a very interesting and informative program that contains personal interviews with the Alliance members and guests, many segments of member accordionists performing individually and also segments of ensemble playing. This program, featuring the Long Island Accordion Alliance (LIAA), is scheduled to be featured on his Cablevision program on Wednesday, March 28, 2018.

Members hope that this program and the positive publicity it will create will bring knowledge of Long Island Accordion Alliance activities to even a much wider audience on Long Island and also reach out to the whole Cablevision viewing area. The publicity potential is enormous.

The current Alliance nucleus consists of nine accordionists. These include Joe Campo, Joe DeClemente, Santo Endrizzi, Dominic Karcic, Bob LaBua, Ray Oreggia, Phil Prete, Frank Scardino and Greg Zukoff.

In August of 2018 the LIAA will celebrate their eighth anniversary. The Long Island Accordion Alliance (LIAA) meets at 6:00 PM the first Wednesday of the month at La Villini Restaurant (631-261-6344), 288 Larkfield Road, East Northport, NY 11731. World Accordion Day

World Accordion Day is an initiative of the Confédération Internationale des Accordeonistes (CIA) and has been very successful, generating a lot of positive publicity for the accordion. A key part of this event is the World Accordion Day website, which serves as a hub of activities.

On May 6, 1829, Cyrill Demian (1772–1849) an organ and piano maker of Armenian origin, accompanied by his two sons Karl and Guido, filed a patent in Vienna, Austria for the accordion.

Consign: No. 1433 listed a new type of instrument consisting of a small box with “feathers of metal plates and bellows fixed to it” making it easy to carry and play. The new instrument was seven to nine inches long, three-and-a-half wide, and two inches high. The bellows were fixed above the box with five claves fixed below. The makers claimed it was possible to perform marches, arias, melodies, even by an amateur of music with little practice and to play the loveliest and most pleasant chords of three, four and five voices with little practice. The May 6th patent application was subsequently approved a short time later on May 23, 1829.

Every association, group, orchestra, performer and teacher, is invited to actively support this event by encouraging national and local accordion activities to happen in their country on this day or the weekend either side of Accordion Day if that should be more convenient. Everyone can register their World Accordion Day activity on the CIA website and is also invited to send a review/report of their event to be included in the WAD archive.

No event is too big or too small. ALL accordion events celebrating World Accordion Day are welcome. This is a CIA promotion for the accordion in which every accordion enthusiast can participate and help bring our accordion world together as well as strongly promote the accordion.

A World of Accordions Museum in Superior, WI will host a live streamed World Accordion Day Festival on May 6, 2018. Included in the live stream will be the popular seminar on the History of the Accordion as narrated by Helmi Harrington, Ph. D.

Dr. Willian Schimmel to perform in "Carousel" on Broadway in NYC


The great 1945 classic "Carousel" by Rodgers and Hammerstein will have its revival at the Imperial Theatre on Broadway. It will be an entirely new production and will include an all star cast including the great opera Diva, Rene Fleming. The new orchestrations are by Jonathan Tunick which will include the accordion, played by Dr. Schimmel. Previews began on February 28 and the official opening is April 9, 2018.

Dr. Schimmel was the featured accordionist with The New York City Ballet in a work by Bruno Moretti entitled “Oltremare” during their February appearance at the David Koch Theater at the Lincoln Center, NYC. “Oltremare” was the third ballet that Mauro Bigonzetti choreographed for NYCB,

all of which are set to scores by his frequent collaborator, Bruno Moretti. About the ballet, which premiered in 2008, Bigonzetti said, “Oltremare”, which translates to ‘beyond the sea,’ explores the feelings of people who have left their homeland on a quest for a better life in a far new land: the sadness of separation, and the excitement and joy of a new world. We see them at port, before they board the ship, saying goodbye to their home, and we see them sharing an emotional journey - crying, laughing, hugging - until finally everything fades away, like the colors of an old postcard.”

Dr. Schimmel was also a guest artist at Joe’s Pub, 425 Lafayette St, New York, NY 10003 on February 4, 2018 at 7:00 PM to celebrate the release of a new CD by the great Klezmer violinist Alicia Svigals. The album is “Beregovski Suite” with pianist Uli Geissendoerfer.

Mary Tokarski to perform in “The Spitfire Grill”

AAA President Mary Tokarski will play the accordion in the production of “The Spitfire Grill” which is an American musical with music and book by James Valcq and lyrics and book by Fred Alley, based on the 1996 film of the same name by Lee David Zlotoff. It won the Richard Rodgers Production Award, administered by The American Academy of Arts and Letters, among many other accolades and outstanding reviews.

The musical depicts the journey of a young woman just released from prison who decides to start her life anew in a rural Wisconsin town. She participates in a journey within the town itself toward its own tenuous reawakening. The score is exciting and contemporary, with many surprises from the small, but effective, orchestra pit. Accordion - Mary Tokarski; Piano - David Harris; Guitar & Mandolin - Bruce Bednarsky; Violin - Lexie Pellegrino; Cello - Andrew Bell.

St. Patrick's Day "Seisun" sponsored by the CAA

March 25, 2018 at 1:00 PM at The Waverly Tavern, 286 Maple Ave., Cheshire, CT 06410. The program will feature host/accordionist Michael Clarke along with vocalist, Kathy Mrazik.

In Irish circles, a "seisiún" is defined as a gathering of Irish traditional performers for the purpose of celebrating their common interest in the music. A participatory event set in a relaxed, informal setting, a seisiún is simply a collaborative, collective sharing of talent and song. The objective in a seisiún is not to provide music, song and stories for an audience of passive listeners.

It should be noted that although what are referred to as "punters" (non-playing attendees) often come for the express purpose of listening, the seisun is most of all for the musicians, singers and storytellers themselves. Simply put, a seisiún is an experience that is shared, not a performance that is bought and sold.

Michael Clarke started playing the piano accordion at the age of six, before he had any say in the matter. His late mother, Rosemary, who came from the County Donegal in Ireland, loved the "squeeze box". Rosemary herself played the piano accordion,

Mr. Clarke realized early on that he, too, loved the accordion, and has since performed regularly on three continents. Mr. Clarke is founding member of Celtic Cross, a celtic-rock band formed in the 1980s in the New York metropolitan area. Mr. Clarke ushered in the tri-state's homage to the "Celtic Tiger" movement by writing and performing on Celtic Cross' popular first album, entitled Part the First. Mr. Clarke has recorded with Tommy Mulvihill, John Nolan, Kitty Kelly, Susan McGrath and Eileen Crowley, and has performed with Paddy Noonan, Dermot O'Brien, the Saw Doctors, The Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem, Michael "Jesse" Owens, the Wolfe Tones, the Commitments, the Jamie Kelly Band and the Andy Cooney Band. Currently, Mr. Clarke regularly performs live an eclectic mix of Irish and 1980s music with the two piece band, McBueller.

23rd Annual Master Class and Concert Series

Dr. William Schimmel will again be the moderator and curator for the 23rd annual American Accordionists' Association (AAA) Master Class and Concert Series (The Seminars) which take place, July 27 - 29, 2018 at the Tenri Cultural Institute, New York City. Master classes are daily, 3-5:00 PM, concerts daily, 7-9:00 PM.

The 2018 Seminars will cover a wide range of topics and will focus on new methods of teaching – 'Ear-teach', 'Eye-teach' and 'Duplex' learning, as well as the study of various method books that have disappeared from the market. The aim is to re-discover some of the rich tradition and culture that may have been lost or discarded. There will also be an 'Accordio/Dalcrose' segment using 'Movement' and 'Eurythmics'. Also, a seminar on 'What it takes to survive as a New York Accordionist' - applicable to any career planning anywhere.

Dr. Schimmel has performed with most of the major symphony orchestras in America, and many chamber music groups in New York. Pop star colleagues range from Sting to Tom Waits, who has commented, "Bill Schimmel doesn't play the accordion, he is the accordion". His many accomplishments include founding the 'Tango Project', teaching, leading master classes, composing, recording, and performing on movie soundtracks.

The Confédération Internationale des Accordéonistes (CIA) has awarded Dr. Schimmel the distinguished Merit Award for the AAA Master Class and Concert Series as well as his contribution to the international accordion scene. He received the American Accordionists' Association (AAA) Distinguished Service Award for Fifty Years of Accordion activity and his work as Lecturer in Residence. He is listed in Who's Who in America and Great Minds of the 21st Century.

Dr. Schimmel, and his wife, choreographer, director, filmmaker Micki Goodman co-founded and co-direct the Institute for Private Studies, a pluralistic think-tank. They have a 29 year old son, Michael, an accordionist and visual artist - and a

Special Olympics gold medal winner.

Joey Miskulin to headline World Accordion Day at AWAM in Superior, WI

A World of Accordions Museum in Superior, WI is excited to announce that renowned accordionist Joseph (Joey) M. Miskulin from Nashville, TN, will headline the weekend's events for the annual Dr. Willard A. Palmer Festival and World Accordion Day hosted at A World of Accordions Museum in Superior, WI on May 5 and 6, 2018.



To acknowledge the importance of the weekend's events, Superior's Mayor Paine is proclaiming May 5 as Dr. Willard A. Palmer Day, and also proclaiming May 6 as World Accordion Day.

Joey is the first accordionist to be inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame. His April 14 induction into the "Nashville Cats" is the highest accolade given to a very select few recording session musicians. The award ceremony highlights the hundreds of albums he recorded with some of music's greatest names that to date result in over 100 million sold.

Joey is extolled nationally as accordionist, arranger, spontaneous improviser, studio musician, pedagogue and unequalled entertainer. In a music career spanning more than four decades, Joey has collaborated with a range of artists including Paul McCartney, John Denver, Ricky Skaggs, Andy Williams, Ricky Van Shelton, Emmylou Harris, Frankie Yankovic, Garth Brooks and many others. Although principally known as a superb performer, his talents extend to many production credits that include Disney/Pixar in Toy Story, and recently in Shanghai, China, where he spent two weeks working with the Walt Disney Company.

Miskulin toured the United States with Frankie Yankovic as his featured accordionist for six years, writing and arranging songs between performances. In the 1990s he joined Riders In The Sky, and with them is billed as "Joey the Cowpolka King." This wholesome Western style group brings smiles, laughter, and excellent musician-ship to every audience.

We proudly mention that his Shania Twain album, in which he played an Italo-Amican "Gloria" rescued from an alley-way trash heap and restored by Lynda Griffith (an ARTS Technician Specialist), has now reached sales in excess of 26 million. His Garth Brooks albums using his PANcordion have collectively reached over 50 million in sales.

Museum Curator Helmi Harrington, Ph. D. recounts in a personal note, "I've known Joey for over 25 years and consider him one of the most accomplished and kindest gentlemen in the accordion world. Despite being supremely lauded in multiple categories, Joey remains a modest celebrity who redirects praise to include larger matters." As he says: "Being the first accordion player ever chosen humbles me, but is certainly a validation of our instrument, and our



fellow players as musicians."

In addition to Joey, the Palmer and World Accordion Day event will showcase the talents of and include the support of Carolyn Carver, Kevin Friedrich, Tracey Gibbens, Dee Langley, Dr. Michael Middleton, Willard A. Palmer III, John Scaffeo and Stanislav (Stas) Venglevski.

Vincent Demor wins NAMM President's Innovation Award

Vincent Demor's dedication and talent paid off when he recently won the 2018 National Association of Music Merchants President's Innovation Award (NAMM).

In the words of the award announcement, Demor "exemplifies a commitment to the music industry and shows a strong aptitude for business leadership and innovation in the music industry." Demor had the opportunity to represent his college at the NAMM show and attend the conference in Anaheim, California in January.

In a recent Interview with Catherine Groegoire, Vincent reflected on what he learned at NAMM, what he brought back and what it means for the future.

When asked about his love for all things accordion, Vincent said he had always been fascinated by his Italian heritage, so when he began learning the accordion, it seemed that he could connect through that.

Vincent stated that he had been involved with the business end of music since his first band at the age of 13. By doing solo gigs, he really learned a lot about the "behind the scenes" work involved with being a performer. There is everything from transportation and living expenses (for some jobs), to personal relations and playing things people request on the spot.

When asked about his experience at the NAMM show, Vincent

said one of the most significant pieces of advice he got at NAMM was to collaborate with others and try out new things.

He hopes to use the knowledge others have passed on, even though all are peers, he feels lucky to have had the NAMM experience to set him apart from others.

A well rounded musician, Vincent started music by learning the cello when he was three and has played in a number of symphonies throughout his adolescent years. He went to region and all-state orchestra every year from Middle School to High School. He continues to study the piano in College and is even trying his skills with the harmonica! ■



Six-Key Flutina, the newest and smallest member of the family

The rare and wonderful six-key Flutina shown on the next page in its A World of Accordions Museum cabinet is at the forefront of eight-key examples of the family, and is complemented by keyed harmonicas and ten-key examples. This smallest of the early accordion types in our collection is a great prize donated in 2017 by Kevin Friedrich, AWAM's Vice President. Despite its presumed age, 1829-30, it is in cosmetically perfect condition and is an appropriate introduction to our May 6, 2018 World Accordion Days Festival.

The name-designation Flutina, derived from the English, is today applied to instruments that have similar appearances and characteristics, though in their times, varying labels relied on the languages of several countries that rapidly took on its production. For example, in Austria, where Cyril Demian presented the first patent on May 6, 1829, they were called "accordion" (the actual patent designation) while in Germany, "harmonika," "handharmonica," or "akkordeon" was used. Depending on local usages and the manner of sound-board insertion, the melody side was played with either left or right hand, and the other hand was used to manipulate the bellows and a large air lever. Bass-chord buttons were not initially present, but were incorporated within the next decades.

Predecessor free-reed instruments, like the Friedrich Buschmann harmonica and the tuning device he is said to have developed into a "complete" instrument, are considered important influences to Demian's invention. Today, the Flutina family is recognized as the progenitor of button diatonic accordions and German concertinas. There is even common ground in development of the piano accordion.


Our remarkable Flutina family continues in three adjacent cabinets housing over two dozen examples: ten-key and twelve-key vari-

eties followed by two-row (two scale) instruments with up to 29 diatonic lever keys, some with tonic and dominant drones or bass/chord buttons, and some with the first "shift" applied to the genus - an additional tremolo reed bank! (The accordion's tremolo bank is said to "meld" the sounds of bored instruments with inexact tunings, making ensemble playing more pleasing.) Most two-row Flutinas present scales a fifth apart, but at least one of ours has scales a half-step apart, perhaps anticipating the "Irish" button diatonics.

Our six-key gem does not like to be analyzed, but with tender disassembly a number of fascinating items are discovered: 1) the handwritten "35D" is found in ink on the soundboard and repeated in less-legible pencil on the underside (could this be Cyril Demian's initial designating the 35th product?) 2) the soundboard (pan) is removable, encased in kidskin; 3) the reed tongues are brass slivers, the reed-plates are slide-inserted and housed much like those of Wheatstone concertinas; 4) rivets attach the tongues to individual brass plates; 5) drone tones, controlled by the player by means of separate levers at the side of the hand-hold, occur as two per plate, sounding two or four tongues on pull or push of the bellows; 6) the only broken tongue is the lowest pitch presumed to have been "F"; 7) the melody side appears to have been played with the left hand.

The instrument sounds an "F" scale in typically German diatonic sequence of opening and closing of bellows (According to Dr. Alfred

Mirek of The Russian Accordion Museum (Moscow), German music commonly begins on a tonic chord harmony, facilitated by initial opening of bellows. In contrast, Eastern music tends to begin with a dominant harmony, similarly facilitated by opening bellows. This explains a discrepancy in preferred pitch organizations among diatonics made in various countries.)

Configuration:

(open) X	A	C	F	A	C
(close) G	Bb	D	E	G	Bb

It has two drone tones: (open) F and A supporting a tonic harmony; (close) C and G supporting a dominant-seventh harmony. Each of the lowest pitches is the root of the chord. ■

Canadian accordionist Michael Bridge has just released a new album in conjunction with his trio, titled *Tales from the Dinarides*. Available for either purchase or download from iTunes. Michael performs on both accordion and piano and is joined by fellow musicians Guillaume Tardif (violin) and Kornel Wolak (clarinet).

The Album begins with two of Brahms' Hungarian Dances (Nos. 1 & 5), followed by the title track 'Tales from the Dinarides', written

for the Trio by Montreal-based composer Airat Ichmouratov, and generously commissioned with funds from the University of Alberta. The next tracks include Smetana's *Die Moldau* and Chopin's *Mazurka in Bb major*, where one might be surprised to hear Michael playing piano. The CD continues with Lutosławski's *Five Dance Preludes* and finishes with Brahms' *Rondo all Zingarese*. In addition to his Trio CD, Michael will also be releasing his new solo recording 'Overture' due to be released in April.

Michael is currently preparing for a tour with the Lodom Ensemble in March which will perform in Moncton, Halifax, Mahone Bay, Antigonish, Pictou and Labrador for a show in Happy Valley-Goose Bay. The Lodom Ensemble combines piano, cello, accordion, and percussion in a unique blend of acoustic chamber and world music that is passionate, sophisticated, and wild. The group met and formed in 2007 while studying music at the University of Toronto. Individual members hail from Alberta (Michael Bridge - accordion), Toronto (Beth Silver - cello), Prince Edward Island (Adam Campbell - percussion), and Ontario by way of Tehran, Iran (Pouya Hamidi - piano). Pouya, the in-house composer, writes original music for the group inspired by Persian and classical fusion but the Canadian spread of the group also reaches across the world and genres as their all-original repertoire incorporates inspirations from Argentinean tango, Serbian folk and dance traditions, Persian classical repertoire, as well as music from the Classical (Bach, Prokofiev) and progressive rock worlds (Radiohead).



As the Easter season approaches, it brings to mind Irving Berlin's famous melody, Easter Parade. The song first came to being in August 1917 under the title "Smile and Show Your Dimple. The song told the story of a World War I soldier and his sweetheart. It was introduced in a show, however the show had a short run. Irving was disappointed because he loved the melody, so he put the song in his trunk and waited for another opportunity to use the song. That opportunity came in 1933 when he was asked to write the music for a show called "As Thousands Cheered Berlin," rewrote the lyrics and introduced the song as Easter Parade. The song was also included in two other Berlin musicals, "Holiday Inn" and "Easter Parade."

The Kick-Off meeting w/ Sy Kushner was great! Thank you all for coming and participating!

Our March 4th meeting featured Robert Duncan and: *"A Beginner's Guide to Improvisation and Surviving Difficult Tunes on the Accordion"*

Most genres of music allow for some form of improvisation, but many beginners regard improvisation as an advanced skill. This workshop is designed to help you navigate chord changes you may have seen in fake books and improvise over basic tunes. Experienced improvisers may also struggle to transfer these skills to their new instrument. While some skills (e.g., stride piano) are much easier on the accordion, playing through chromatic or minor harmony in the left hand seems to demand large leaps or difficult stretches. This workshop will show beginners and experts how to use alternate fingerings and chord substitutions to play difficult passages. The workshop covered:

1. History of Jazz Accordion
2. Improvisation in other styles
3. Basic song forms
4. Jazz clichés
5. Left-hand voicings with bass
6. Left-hand voicings with no bass
7. Improvising over the blues
8. Improvising over "Rhythm Changes"
9. Improvising in traditional jazz
10. Comping in traditional jazz
11. Rootless voicings & comping in modern jazz and other styles

Robert Duncan is an Associate Professor of Cognitive Behavioral Neuroscience at the City University of New York, and he received a BA in Music Humanities at the University of California at San Diego. He is a recovering jazz pianist and swing dancer who spent eight years directing a traditional jazz band and Lindy Hop dance ensemble in California. He is the founder and director of Bachtopus, an accordion quartet that features the music of living composers and JS Bach. You can also find him playing with Karl Meyer as the Wisterians, a violin-accordion duo that plays salon music, bal musette, and gypsy jazz. Recently, he started playing with the Reservation Jazz Hall Band, a traditional jazz ensemble comprised of swing dancers. ■
