



During the latter part of 2018, my granddaughter Emily expressed her desire to go to Ireland for her upcoming 16th birthday in 2019. She wanted to include my daughter Susan and my wife Janet, leaving me alone at home

for about a week. That situation stirred up the idea of visiting my old buddy Jack in the Philippines who was the pastor of the Payatas Baptist Church which is located northeast of Manila. So I purchased airfare tickets to the Philippines.

Pastor Jack Wilson has a fantastic music ministry to the children in the Philippines, which includes; violins, piano, guitars and flutes, however no one there plays the accordion. So my original thought was to bring my accordion on the trip so I could use it to minister to the kids. After further consideration I thought it might be better to see if I could get a couple of accordions and some music books to donate to their church.

During the next few months I was able to acquire a few accordions but none suitable for the kids. Then I got a call from another buddy who worked for the Salvation Army who told me he had a broken medium size Casino accordion. I got hold of that box and had to do major surgery on the bass machine to fix it. After further discussion, the Salvation Army agreed to donate that box for my trip which was perfect for the older kids.

During January 2019, I reworked several other accordions, sold them and bought a beautiful small red Weltmeister Stella accordion which was perfect for the smaller kids.

On April 23rd, I got a call that one of my former students wanted



to donate his old accordion to someone, so I told him about my planned trip. It now looks like I will be taking 3 accordions to the Philippines.

It's now July 22nd with only a few days to go. About a week or so ago, Pastor Jack informed me that it was going to be his 20th Anniversary on July 29th and he wanted me to play for him.

Well, it's July 24th and the taxi is due to pick me up at 11pm tonight. I'm all packed up & ready to go. On July 25th, at 1:45 am, I took the 16 hour flight to Manila to see Pastor Jack.

I arrived in the Philippines at 6:30am and met Pastor Jack Wilson and his family. On Saturday, I had the opportunity to meet the adults and kids from his church. I fell in love with them immediately.

All three accordions that I brought with me made it in perfect condition. I also met Assistant Pastor Ben Quezada who instantly wanted to learn how to play. So we gave him the challenge that if he learned a song in 1 week we would give him 40 Pesos (about \$.80). He has been practicing "Amazing Grace" ever since.

On Sunday morning before Pastor Jack preached he asked me to play a song so I played and sang "Why Me Lord". I believe that the words to that song say it all. After several days I found that 2 other people

from the



church wanted to learn to play the accordion too. These people are incredible. I just fell in love with them.

My trip home was scheduled for Monday, August 5th and I know that I will be shedding some tears when I have to say my goodbyes.

What a blessing it has been to meet these people and share my Faith & Music with them. ■

Henry Doktorski to Perform for Atlanta Opera's Production of "Frida" in October

Henry Doktorski (pictured far right) has been selected to play accordion for the Atlanta Opera's production of "Frida" by Robert Xavier Rodríguez on October 5, 9, 11 and 13, 2019.

"Frida" is a fantastical theater piece combining pantomime, puppetry, movement and vocal performers. Frida enlists mariachi instruments to heat up this blend of tango, zarzuela, ragtime, 1930s jazz and vaudeville. The story conjures a vivid portrait of the courageous revolutionary and magical realist Frida Kahlo as she struggles with her torrid marriage to Mexican muralist Diego Rivera.

Accordionist Henry Doktorski grew up in East Brunswick, New Jersey, and attended twelve years of Catholic Schools. He received a Bachelor of Music degree with a double major in Piano Performance and Music Education at Park College (today Park University) in Parkville, Missouri. He received a Master Degree in Music Composition at Duquesne University, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. In 2016 he moved to Southern California.

Henry began accordion lessons at the age of seven and studied with Anthony Maiorana at Hi-Way Music in East Brunswick. In high school he abandoned the accordion and began playing a Farfisa organ with a rock band. Around the same time he joined the Saint Peters High School (New Brunswick, New Jersey) choir and

discovered classical music and his lifelong career. In college he studied Piano Performance and Music Education.

Later he discovered the classical accordion subculture and became hooked on classical music for the accordion. Since then he has performed with dozens of symphony orchestras, including the Pittsburgh Symphony, Detroit Symphony, Tanglewood Festival Orchestra, Fairbanks Alaska Summer Arts Festival Orchestra, and others.

Mario Tacca was born in Italy. During his childhood, his family moved to the Alsace Lorraine region of France where he began his musical studies. This is where his love and intense desire to play the accordion began. He loved the sound! He would pick up the accordion and imitate some of the songs his mother used to sing. The desire and love never diminished, despite having to walk three miles weekly to his teacher with his instrument strapped to his back!

As a dynamic and popular performing duo, they have completed two concert tours of China.

The Yorkvillians include Dan Cooper (8 string bass guitar), Bill Schimmel (accordion), Michiyo Suzuki (clarinet) and John Ferrari (drum set). From the term for residents of the Yorkville neighborhood on the Upper East Side of Manhattan, The Yorkvillians are a new instrumental combo led by composer-bassist Dan Cooper and composer-accordionist William Schimmel.

Dan Cooper, a Manhattan-native composer and multi-instrumentalist, was educated at Columbia, New England Conservatory and Princeton. He has composed for Absolute Ensemble, Albany Symphony, Empire State Youth Orchestra, Shakespeare & Company, and Imani Winds, among others. A director of Composers Concordance and a SUNY professor, he has performed at numerous venues internationally, from CBGB's to Town Hall, Sydney Opera House and Royal Albert Hall.

Dr. William Schimmel, one of the principal architects in the resurgence of the accordion, holds Bachelor of Music, Master of Science, and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees in composition from the Juilliard School. Schimmel's music has been featured in a number of television shows and films, perhaps most notably 'Scent of a Woman' starring Al Pacino, where he appears in the famous Tango scene. Dr. Schimmel performs music in many genres, has commissioned and premiered hundreds of new works, has written a number of books and articles and has made numerous recordings and videos.

A native of Japan, Michiyo Suzuki began her musical studies with piano at age three, violin at age six and clarinet at age thirteen.

Reider is the leader of a "staggeringly virtuosic band" (RnR Magazine) of bluegrass and jazz musicians based in Brooklyn called The Human Hands.

Following the release of their critically-acclaimed record *Too Hot to Sleep* (2018), Sam and the Human Hands have appeared at major festivals and venues throughout the US and the UK and performed live on the BBC. Irresistible melodies, fiery improvisation and otherworldly sounds collide

72nd Coupe Mondiale in Shenzhen, China

The 72nd Coupe Mondiale World Accordion Championships and Festival was held in Shenzhen, China from August 13 - 17, 2019 under the auspices of the Confédération Internationale des Accordéonistes (CIA) hosted by the Chinese CIA member, The *cont'd. on next page*



on NPR when he graduated high school. At Columbia University, he fell in love with American folk music. While writing his senior thesis comparing the song writing of Woody Guthrie and Ira Gershwin, Sam began studying bluegrass and old-time, transcribing the fiddle melodies for the accordion and learning to sing the songs. This set him off on a journey that has taken him from back porches and dive bars to concert halls and major festivals in practically every state in the country.

Representing the U.S. Department of State as a musical ambassador, Sam has travelled to China, Laos, Cambodia, Myanmar, Vietnam, Estonia, Turkey and Azerbaijan, carrying his accordion on his back everywhere he goes and collaborating with international artists. Sounds and stories from these travels frequently serve as the inspiration for Reider's compositions, which together form an ongoing musical travelogue.

As a side-man, collaborator and recording artist, Reider has worked with artists including Sierra Hull, Jorge Glem, Phoebe Hunt, Courtney Hartman, Jon Batiste and Stay Human, T-Pain, David Amram, Nellie McKay, Ranger Doug, the Brother Brothers and more. A passionate educator, Reider leads ongoing performances for public school students throughout the New York City area in partnership with Jazz at Lincoln Center. He has designed curricula and taught courses at the Stanford Jazz Festival, San Francisco Jazz, and other private institutions around the country.

Keep a special eye out for August 8th at Bard College's Fisher Center Spiegelent where they are teaming up with the Catskill Jazz Factory and award-winning vocalist Kéren Tayár for a tribute to Joni Mitchell and other singers of the Sixties.

The Human Hands will be touring in October with numerous dates in the Northwest, Colorado and Northeast including October 11th - Monmouth, OR, 13th - Ferndale, CA, 15th - Boise, ID, 16th - Enterprise, OR, 17th - Prosser, WA, 18th - Seattle, WA, 19th - Portland, OR, 20th - Denver, CO, 22nd - Ft. Collins, CO, 24th - Beaver Creek, CO, 25th - Georgetown, CO and November 1st - Burlington, VT. ■

Accordion Association of Chinese Musicians Association (CAA).

The largest event ever held by the CIA, the competition featured 160 competitors in seven categories (Coupe Mondiale, Masters Coupe Mondiale, Junior Coupe Mondiale, Virtuoso Entertainment, Junior Virtuoso Entertainment and Ensemble Music in both Classical and World Music divisions) judged by more than 50 jury members.

The 142nd General Assembly of Delegates was attended by over 75 Delegates from around the world including Executive Officers, Music Committee members and International Delegates.

At the General Assembly, CIA President Mirco Patarini (Italy) welcomed Delegates to the second CIA event held in China, the 72nd Coupe Mondiale Festival in Shenzhen. Apologies for non-attendance were recorded and the minutes of the 141st General Assembly in Tallinn, Estonia were adopted. The General Assembly were offered reports from Mirco Patarini (President), Kimmo Mattila (General Secretary), Harley Jones (Public Relations Manager) and Alexander Selivanov (Chairperson of the Music Committee).

CIA Members reported on activities including:

- Sonja Palinich (President of the New Zealand Accordion Association) announced a new 2020 competition promoting the music of New Zealand composer Gary Daverne.
- Lionel Reekie announced the Australian Accordion Teachers Association (AATA) festival in Sydney from the 25th - 28 July, 2020.
- Liz Finch and Joan Sommers reported on the national festival held in Denver, CO and the upcoming 80th ATG Anniversary Celebrations to be held in Los Angeles from August 5-9, 2020.
- Mary Tokarski reported on their 2019 festival and upcoming 2020 Festival in Alexandria, VA from July 8-12, 2020, as well as the Lifetime Achievement Award dinner for renowned US entertainer Joey Miskulin.
- Herbert Scheibenreif reported on the World Diatonic Competition for all ages and styles held in Austria.

At request of the current appointee Kevin Friedrich, the position of the CIA Ambassador, an Executive Appointment from 2009 was clarified and modified. With several changes in Administration that made that appointment, it was an appropriate time to re-examine this position, which has served as a part of the CIA Executive Committee for 10 years. The Congress considered three options (1) to keep the position as an open ended appointment, (2) to allow a new appointment by each administration or (3) to make the position a formal voting member of the Executive decided by the General Assembly. The General Assembly in Tallinn, Estonia chose to make the role of Ambassador a Voting member of the Executive Committee. The General Assembly in Shenzhen ap-

proved the formal statute change to make this an elected voting member of the CIA Executive Committee. The call for nominations and voting for the position of Ambassador will take place to coincide with the Winter Congress in Prague, 2020.

In addition to the competitions, numerous concerts were held including featuring renowned Chinese and International guests including the Shenzhen Symphony Orchestra - Lin Daye, Conductor with soloists Mao Junhao, Tan Jialiang, Radu Ratoi and Yuri Shishkin; 'Double Sense' Cao Ye and Tan Jialiang; Beijing Children's Palace Baidi Accordion Orchestra, Chen Weiliang - Conductor; The Motion Trio (Poland) and Radu Ratoi (the immediate past Coupe Mondiale Champion).

The grand finale of the Coupe Mondiale festival was the Gala Concert featuring all the winners from the festival culminating in the magnificent World Accordion Orchestra XI under the direction of Joan C. Sommers and Chen Weiliang. The orchestra comprised some 140 players including the contestants, the Chinese hosts and many of the International Jury and Delegates.

The World Accordion Orchestra performed three works. (1) 'Carefree! The Yi People' a piece adapted from the Folk Songs of the Yi people, the home (Yi) of the Sheng, the instrument from which the principle of the accordion and the reeds inside producing sound is derived. (2) The Triumphal March from Aida by Giuseppe Verdi (1813-1901). The work was given its first performance in Cairo, Egypt, in December, 1871. After being first commissioned by Isma'il Pasha, Khedive (Viceroy or Governor) of Egypt, for a performance in January of that year, the premiere was delayed to the December date because of the Franco-Prussian War. (3) In honor of the 70th Anniversary of the formation of the People's Republic of China, the concert concluded with the magnificent "Long live the Motherland!". Composed by Liu Chi and Qin Yongcheng and adapted by the Beijing Children's Palace Accordion Orchestra, the piece of music connects the theme and the melody of two well-known songs, 'My Homeland' and 'Me and My Homeland' with great finesse, expressing the sincere love and gratitude to the great Motherland.

Founded in 1935 as a global entity comprising National accordion organizations from around the world, the CIA has continued the tradition of accordion excellence for more than 80 years. The organization moves around the world at least twice a year, with the Coupe Mondiale held during its Summer Congress, followed by the Winter Congress which brings the excitement of an international event to the host countries, offering members an opportunity to experience first-hand its diverse global accordion

cultures, while uniting that diversity and promoting the status of the instrument.

Representing the USA in Shenzhen were Liz Finch (ATG Delegate and International Jury Member) and Joan Cochran Sommers (ATG Delegate, CIA Honorary Member and Conductor of the World Accordion Orchestra), Mary Tokarski (AAA Delegate and International Jury Member), Nathan Chapeton (student of Mary Tokarski and competitor in the Coupe Mondiale Masters category representing the AAA), Kevin Friedrich (CIA Ambassador and Board member of both AAA and ATG) and guest Gail Campanella an ATG member from California, attending her first Coupe Mondiale.

The United States Premiere Voting member, the AAA presented one competitor, Nathan Chapeton who competed in the Coupe Mondiale Masters category. Attracting more than 50 entries, the category was adjudicated over three full days of competition.

Nathan gave an outstanding and artistically superb performance and in this most demanding of categories, the largest ever hosted at a Coupe Mondiale, he placed very creditably in the top third of the players at 16th place. Nathan Chapeton performed: J. S. Bach - Prelude and Fugue In G Major, Viatcheslav Semionov - Prophetic Dream, Franck Angelis - Suite, Mov. III Asia Flashes and A. Kusyakov - Sonata No. 6.

The Accordion World Mourns the Loss of One of its Finest: Lynn Singleton Ewing, 1951-2019

It is with great, great sadness that I write about the sudden death of my long time close friend, Lynn Ewing. Although I had been asked to write for the AAA and ATG newsletters weeks ago, it has simply been too painful to put my thoughts, feelings and facts into words until now.

Lynn called me from the airport on August 9, just hours before she died. She was so upbeat and really looking forward to this trip to see her daughter. When Lynn and her husband Gail arrived in Albuquerque, they all went out to dinner, then came home and enjoyed a few card games together. As the sun was rising the following morning, Lynn took her last breath.

Accordionist Lynn Singleton Ewing, long time resident of San Carlos, California, died suddenly of cardiac arrest on August 10, 2019, in Albuquerque, New Mexico, while visiting her daughter Kristin Meeker.

Lynn was born and raised in San Diego, California where she studied the accordion, competed in the Western States accordion competitions, and taught beginning accordion and band. As family, work as a flight attendant, remarriage and the pursuit of a college degree became priorities, the accordion was set aside.

After hearing a concert 25 years ago, featuring Seattle's beloved accordionist Bonnie Birch, Lynn was inspired to pick up her accordion again. She immediately became very active in the San Francisco Accordion Club. Soon Lynn was a member of the club's delightful "ACE Ensemble", under the direction of Joseph Smiel, Sr., began performing duets with the renowned accordionist Sharon Greyhosky, and eventually became the president of the San Francisco Accordion Club. Lynn also joined the group "AbsolutAccord", under the direc-

tion of Richard Yaus. This stellar group of accordionists performed regularly throughout California for several years.

Soon Lynn was attending accordion camps, and the Cotati, ATG and AAA Festivals. Once you met Lynn, you could never forget her: her sparkling beauty and loving personality lit up every room she entered. A knowledgeable and dependable musician, she was always ready and willing to help whenever and wherever needed.

Lynn and I met in the summer of 2005 at the Silver Falls Accordion Camp in Oregon. We were roommates and became instant, life-long friends. During the fourteen years since we first met, we travelled together all over the US, the San Juan Islands, British Columbia, France and Italy with accordions in tow. In between, we celebrated family weddings, our birthdays and other occasions together whenever we could.

I want to emphasize that the accordion was not the only thing in her amazingly full and productive life. Lynn and Gail Ewing were married for 34 years and between them had four children and six grandchildren. The couple traveled extensively worldwide. They were also members of the Unitarian Universalists Church of San Mateo. During those years, Lynn served as Director of Religious Education, sang in their choir, officiated at weddings, and the list goes on.

One would think that such a busy person would have little time for other relationships. Not so with Lynn. She was a true friend to so many. *I could not have asked for a better, more dedicated friend. RIP, my caring, energetic, musically gifted, very loving "sister".*

A celebration of Lynn's life will take place on October 12, 2019 at 10:30 am at the Filoli House and Gardens: 86 Canada Road, Woodside, California. Gail Campanella and I have been asked to be the accordionists for this celebration. A buffet lunch will be served after the service. If you plan to attend, please email deeanamc@yahoo.com ■


Remembering Verne Uvezian Deffner

Verne Uvezian (nee Deffner) born on September 22, 1953, passed away September 21st, 2019 just one day shy of her 66th birthday.

Verne Uvezian (nee Deffner) was the only child of the late Ernest and Faithe Deffner, and grew up in Greenwich Village in New York City, before the family business relocated to Mineola, (Long Island) New York. More recently she lived in Garden City and East Williston, NY before settling in Boynton Beach, FL.

After majoring in English in College, throughout her career Verne worked in Graphic Arts, Copy Editing, Proofreading and Publishing and Sales as well as periodic tenures with her Mother Faithe Deffner at the family business 'Ernest Deffner Inc.' which was founded in 1934.

More recently Verne became a published author, with her popular Children's book 'The Day Benny Stuck His Neck Out' addressing the issue of 'bullying' because children were different. (NB. Benny the Giraffe, the



book's main character, was different from everybody at home or in his school - he had a short neck). "It teaches children that disabilities can be looked at in a positive light. You have to believe that being different is a wonderful thing. It gives children a marvelous sense of compassion because they are different and they know how a caring gesture or word can make them feel better," she said. She focuses her message on ability rather than inability.

After the 2014 passing of her Mother, accordion identity Faithe Deffner, Verne was instrumental in ensuring all her Mother's historical materials from a lifetime of work in the accordion industry were transferred to the World of Accordions Museum in Superior, Wisconsin, where they became part of The Deffner Legacy display. A mammoth undertaking, more than 70 boxes of materials were driven from New York to the Museum. Faithe was a major inspiration in expanding the World of Accordions Museum to its current location, and thanks to Verne's efforts, the Deffner Legacy will be showcased for generations to come.

Verne married Ronny Uvezian in June 2010 and the couple celebrated in a reception with friends and family on August 28th 2010 in Bayville, Long Island. After several years in New York together, the couple moved permanently to Florida in 2014.

Los Angeles Based Composer Leonard 'Lenny' Stack Passes Away

Renowned Los Angeles based composer, arranger and music director Leonard 'Lenny' Stack has passed away. Born on 18 June 1938, Lenny passed away on September 22, 2019 at age 81. Lenny is survived by his wife Lora.

During his career, Los Angeles native Lenny Stack wrote arrangements for the Doc Severinsen Tonight Show Band, the Buddy Rich Big Band and the Louis Bellson Big Band. A talented composer, Lenny wrote original songs for recording artists including Diana Ross and Dionne Warwick. In addition to being an Emmy Award winning arranger, he had also been the musical director, composer and arranger for many television series, specials and motion pictures including the Golden Globes, the SAG Awards and the American Music Awards. Lenny Stack's Big Band is known for its appealing arrangements and excellent execution by some of Los Angeles's most talented musicians.

Leonard (Lenny) Stack received his Bachelor of Music in Composition from the University of Southern California (USC) and studied composition with Halsey Stevens, Robert Linn, Mario Castelnuovo-Tedesco and Miklos Rosza.

He has published numerous works for various classical ensembles consisting of: Sonata for Clarinet and Piano, Ballads No. 1 and No. 2 for Flute and Piano, Scherzo for Saxophone Quartet and Scherzo for 3 Clarinets and Bass Clarinet published by Southern Music Company in addition to two works for Accordion Orchestra.

His two compositions for Accordion Orchestra include 'Lest We Forget' and 'Film Noir: City at Night.' Both works were composed at the request of his close friend and Los Angeles based work colleague Liz (Elizabeth) Finch.

Lest We Forget was commissioned by the UMKC Accordion Orchestra for the inaugural World Accordion Orchestra held at the 2007 American Accordionists' Association (AAA) and Accordionists and Teachers Guild, International (ATG) jointly hosted CIA Coupe Mondiale World Accordion Championships Festival in Alexandria, VA (Washington, DC), USA.

The programmatic element in it deals with the insanity and misery leading up to and resulting from war. Contained in the composition are jingoistic cries for victory overwhelmed by the suffering of humanity. The music begins with a bleak and austere opening section, which then segues into the first combative episode. This scheme repeats itself throughout the composition. After the battle is a sad, wistful melody followed by another disruption of the peace. Then, a fugal section is employed, followed by the inverted fugal subject meant to depict the clash of opposing armies. Then there is a recapitulation of that sad, wistful melody which serves as a short reprieve between battles. When the military drums begin we have the final clashing of armies with a trite patriotic theme in the back-

ground. Finally all is still, victor and vanquished lie together mortally wounded and the short angry coda summarizes the entire folly.

Marking his first accordion composition, Lenny attended the World Premiere performance of Lest We Forget, conducted by Joan Cochran Sommers on Saturday, 18 August 2007.

His second work Film Noir: City at Night was performed by World Accordion Orchestra II in Glasgow, Scotland on Saturday, 25 October, 2008, also conducted by Joan Cochran Sommers. The programmatic idea for Film Noir, is of a dark deserted street at night where menace lurks anywhere. The second theme announces a "floozy" sauntering in. The middle section increases in tension and violence as all sorts of mayhem occurs. Finally the main theme is recapitulated and it ends with a quiet ominousness. This music is reminiscent of the film noir movies of the late 1940's and early 1950's.

Film Noir: City at Night has since been performed under the direction of Joan C. Sommers by groups such as the University of Missouri – Kansas City (UMKC) Accordion Orchestra (2009), the ATG Festival Orchestra (2019) and is to be performed by the Las Vegas International Accordion Orchestra in October.

A member of ASCAP and the Television Academy, Lenny won the coveted Emmy Award for arranging for the television special, "Screen Actor's Guild 50th Anniversary and an Emmy nomination as Musical Director of the television special, "Disneyland's 30th Anniversary Celebration." ■

The famed Hank Thunander is a favorite entertainer throughout the region and beyond. His personable nature radiates through his music in an amazing breadth of repertory.

Hank has many recognitions to his credit, including election to the Minnesota Music Hall of Fame. Often featured in Chmielewski FunTime, and Minnesota State Fair events, Hank is an amazing musician in his ability to tailor programs to suit various audiences and to respond to requested tunes. While known for his spontaneous interpretations in any “key,” and for his stylistic accuracy in performing 18 types of polkas, Hank can also incorporate other dimensions in his programs. For example, he plans to explain the music demonstrated as a learning experience to benefit accordionists and musicians in our hall.

Personally befriended with Frankie Yankovic, Hank promotes old-time, ethnic, and popular modern favorites. His Cleveland-style polkas are enhanced through his use of a 1937 ItaloAmerican Special piano accordion, very much like the one we restored for his friend of long-standing, Joey Miskulin. We have several similar accordions displayed in the museum.

Mae West and the Count: Love and Loss on the Vaudeville Stage

In the world of sober musical research, it is not often that the word “titillating” can be used. Often even the word “fascinating” may be difficult to apply. This book has every element of enjoyable reading—humor, a lusty love affair, and facts that shed light on an era in American life.


The book *Mae West and the Count: Love and Loss on the Vaudeville Stage*, is exceptional. Written by the son of Guido Deiro and based on his father’s oral reports and written documents, the biographic novel delves into the lives of an accordion virtuoso and a notorious beauty whose dual rise to fame in vaudeville and theater stardom remain legendary. The sometimes glorious, sometimes tragic incidents read as factual; fictionalizations are not readily apparent. The writing is detailed but not overworked.

Guido’s life story tells of numerous eccentricities and love affairs, the most notable of which is certainly his involvement with and eventual marriage to stage and film star Mae West. He was a handsome, charismatic, and spirited person who gained substantial wealth through his performances, music schools and instrument sales. He was responsible for manufacture of various accordions, some of which are pictured in the book and are identical to models found in our museum.

An Italian pioneer among accordionists in America, Guido’s performances shaped the dreams of many as he composed and performed music that is still considered dazzling entertainment. Accordionists should follow the track of author Count Guido Roberto Deiro’s view that his father’s story goes beyond interesting reading to amend conventional views of the history of piano accordions in America.

Guido’s performance accordion was installed in our concert hall at Henry Doktorski’s special concert in 2005. It stands alongside that of his brother’s (Pietro Deiro) in the Special Exhibits Area. Both instruments were donated to AWAM through the generosity of Deiro family members, who bequeathed Guido’s estate to the CUNY Center for the Study of Free-Reed Instruments, headed by director Allan Atlas.




