

Meet your New AAA Executive Committee Members

As 2023 begins, we offer our sincere thanks to our outgoing President Dr. Joseph A. Ciccone, who led the American Accordionists' Association from 2019-2022. As we do so, we welcome and introduce to you the officers who will lead the AAA as the new Executive Committee for 2023-2024.

President: Frank Busso Jr has served on the AAA board of directors since 2007 and as the organization's 2nd Vice President since 2021. He is the director of the Ernest Deffner Affiliates, whose brands include Titano, PANcordion, Pigini, Excelsior, Roland, and Hohner. Frank is the accordionist for The United States Air Force Band in Washington, DC and runs the Busso Music School in Alexandria, VA. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration from Boston University, later serving as an instructor and arranger with the Boston University Athletic Bands. Frank studied accordion with Frank Busso Sr at the Staten Island Music School in New York, eventually becoming an instructor there, where his students earned many regional and national titles in competition.

1st Vice President: Frank Busso Sr has served on the governing board of the American Accordionists' Association for over 45 years. He has held the offices of President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, and Treasurer. Frank started studying and playing accordion at age 7. Since then, he has achieved great successes as a performer throughout the New York metropolitan area. As director of the Staten Island Music School in New York, Frank taught many award-winning students and conducted numerous classical & festival accordion orchestras. He was also the music teacher at two parochial schools for over 25 years. Currently a resident of northern Virginia and Palm Beach, Florida, Frank continues to perform and arrange orchestral works.



Secretary: Rita Davidson Barnea is an honors graduate of the University of Connecticut, having received a Bachelor of Science degree in Music Education, and has been a member of the AAA board for many years. For over 14 years, Rita has served as the national editor of accordionusa.com, covering accordion artists, concerts, and other events taking place in North America. She presents workshops and concerts on "The Life and Music of Eugene Ettore," "The Use of the Accordion in the Teaching of Music in School," and "How to Organize a Children's Birthday Party" centered around the use of the accordion. Rita has adjudicated for many accordion competitions over the years, and performed in concerts, for workshops, and at accordion festivals throughout the USA. She retired from a 30-year career as a public school music teacher in West Orange, New Jersey, where she used her accordion every day in the classroom and as an accompanist for concerts and programs. AAA selects Antonio Spaccarotella (Italy) for New Commissioned Work

Italian composer and accordionist Antonio Spaccarotella has been chosen by the AAA Composers' Commissioning Committee to write a new work for accordion, adding to an impressive array of repertoire commissioned by the American Accordionists' Association.

Despite his relatively young age, Antonio Spaccarotella is among the most brilliant and multifaceted accordionists of the new generation. He has led numerous performance projects ranging from solo to symphony orchestra in over 30 countries. Antonio is the Production Director of the OFC Calabrian Philharmonic Orchestra and supports its leader Filippo Arlia for all productions, collaborations, recordings, and projects.

In 2017, Antonio made his debut as a soloist at the Kaunas Philharmonic (Lithuania) on the occasion of the world premiere of Skrya Horiental Tango, an original composition for accordion and symphony orchestra that embodies his personal idea of research and avant-garde accordion. He is involved in various higher education institutes in Italy and abroad, holding seminars and master classes at: Shanghai Normal University (China), Department of Music of the Federal University of Paraiba (Brazil), Conservatoire National de Musique et Art Coreographique de Rabat (Morocco), Stanislao Giacomantonio State Conservatory of Music (Italy), the prestigious Gnessin Academy of Moscow (Russia), and Tchaikovsky Conservatory of Music (Italy) where he has also conducted the Philharmonic Orchestra of Calabria.



In 2016, the Italian Accordion Culture nominated him Accordion Ambassador for his many achievements and enhancement of the Italian accordion to the world. In 2017, the Confédération Internationale des Accordéonistes (International Music Council – UNESCO) awarded him the CIA Merit Award along with Yuri Shiskin at the CIA Coupe Mondiale in Rostov on Don (Russia), and in 2018, he was awarded honorary professorship by the National Academy S. Rachmaninov – Rostov State Music Conservatory (Russia).

Antonio is one of the seven members elected by the Confédération Internationale des Accordéonistes (CIA) Congress to be a member of the prestigious Music Committee. He is professor of classical and traditional accordion at the Tchaikovsky Catanzaro-Nocera Terinese

State Conservatory of Music and founding president of the Astor Piazzolla Academy, the first and exclusive academy in the world of the Astor Piazzolla Foundation of Buenos Aires, directed by Laura Escalada Piazzolla.

The new work will be premiered by world champion accordionist Grayson Masefield at the 2023 AAA Festival, with the composer himself in attendance.

AAA Composers' Commissioning Committee, by Dr. Robert Young McMahan



In the mid-1940s, a newly married young woman, accordionist Elsie Bennett (nee Blum), moved with her groom from her native Detroit to his native Brooklyn, where they settled and established a music school in their new home on Empire Boulevard. Elsie had been pursuing a bachelor's degree in music theory back home at Wayne State University when she met her future husband, Mort Bennett. To complete her degree, she took transferable courses in orchestration and composition at Columbia University. Soon thereafter, Elsie pursued a master's degree at Columbia and was allowed to use accordion as her principal instrument. However, she had to rely on classical transcriptions of major works by composers of the past for most of her "traditional" repertoire, which was permitted due to the lack of reputable original works for accordion from the nineteenth century, when the instrument was invented and still going through its early evolutionary stages.

Regarding contemporary repertoire, the problem was even greater, and Elsie found it difficult to find acceptable original or transcribed compositions by notable composers of the twentieth century to satisfy that part of her final recital requirements. To help solve this problem for Elsie and future aspiring classical accordionists, her principal professor and advisor, distinguished composer and electronic music pioneer Otto Luening, informed her that the accordion would probably never gain a sizable original repertoire of significance from recognized composers until the latter were commissioned and paid to write for it.

Having recently joined the governing board of the then-15-year-old AAA, Elsie invited her mentor to speak at its next meeting with the aim of convincing its members to recognize this need and commence to commission worthy composers. The board voted to create a composers' commissioning committee, with Elsie serving as its chair. Elsie took on the charge with great passion and three years later, in 1957, succeeded in persuading the internationally-famous New York composer Paul Creston to produce the AAA's first commissioned composition, Prelude and Dance (Opus 69). Many great composers and accordionist-composers were to follow in the ensuing decades.

I came on the scene in the early 1990s, having moved from the Baltimore area to New Jersey to accept a professorship in music theory and composition at The College of New Jersey (formerly Trenton State College). Though I had not been involved with the AAA since my student days competing in its national competitions, I contacted Elsie in the hope of seeing her correspondence with one of her distinguished past commissionees, William Grant Still, for an article I had been invited by another organization to write for a music conference in honor of the late composer's hundredth birthday. She generously complied and soon invited me to join the governing board of the AAA as a member of the Composers' Commissioning Committee. In this capacity, I assisted her in selecting and commissioning composers, wrote articles on past commissioned composers for the annual AAA Festival journal, performed their works at AAA events and other concerts, and authored a manual on how to compose for the accordion (see below for link).

Elsie was the AAA's sole Composers' Commissioning Committee chairperson into the early 2000s, only retiring from it and passing the title to this writer a short time before her passing in 2005. At the time of her retirement, the AAA Governing Board honored her with the title of Composers' Commissioning Committee Chairperson Emeritus. In addition, the annual Elsie Bennett Composition Competition, with both open and junior divisions, was established shortly after her death, and has added many fine works to the classical accordion repertoire. During her half century of dedicated and all-consuming service, Elsie achieved the amazing feat of having commissioned 33 composers who wrote 55 works collectively. They will always stand as a significant and pioneering part of the core of now well over a thousand and still increasing concert compositions for or including accordion worldwide.

AAA Festival Orchestra to be Conducted by Joan Cochran Sommers

This year's 85th Anniversary AAA Festival Orchestra will be under the direction of renowned conductor Joan Cochran Sommers.

Joan was awarded the title of Professor Emerita upon retirement from the University of Missouri Kansas Conservatory of Music (USA), where she established and taught the accordion degree program for 40 years. She has arranged innumerable works for accordion orchestra over many years, often Accordion for the **UMKC** Orchestra, a large symphonic accordion orchestra, which, under her direction, competed in and won more first prizes in Virtuoso Accordion Orchestra Competitions than any other American group. This record is still unbroken today. In addition to her work with orchestras, Joan taught numerous accordionists over many decades, many who went on to distinguish themselves as artists, competition winners, and music professionals.

In both 1955 and 1956, she earned the right to represent the USA in the Coupe Mondiale, and those experiences opened her eyes to the tremendous opportunities available to accordionists; perhaps it also fixed her lifelong interest in worldwide accordion activities. In 2011, she celebrated the 50th anniversary of her UMKC Accordion Orchestra



when they presented their 50th Gala Concert at the university. Joan is also the founder of the founder of the CIA World Accordion Orchestra, which has presented concerts and premieres in many countries around the world, with the orchestra often boasting more than 100 members.

Sommers has Joan C. held positions in several music organizations, including Accordionists & Teachers Guild International (ATG) and Confédération Internationale des Accordéonistes (CIA – IMC-UNESCO). Today, Professor Sommers enjoys performing with fellow accordionists in duo, with other instrumentalists, and with the UMKC Chamber Accordion Ensemble. In addition to her she continues performing, adjudicate, coach soloists, prepare accordion orchestra arrangements, and conduct accordion orchestras regularly. After her retirement as CIA Vice President, she was

unanimously awarded the status of CIA Honorary Member.

John Torcello Performs with the Los Angeles Philharmonic

Accordionist John Torcello was the featured accordionist in the recent Los Angeles Philharmonic performance of John Adams' powerful opera, Girls of the Golden West.

John Adams' opera, Girls of the Golden West, is a rejection of the whitewashed romantic view of California in the early days of the Gold Rush. Director Peter Sellars drew from historical texts when he created the libretto, particularly from the memoirs of a woman who called herself Dame Shirley. As Sellars has said, "These true stories of the Forty-Niners are overwhelming in their heroism, passion, and cruelty, telling tales of racial conflicts, colorful and humorous exploits, political strife and struggles to build new life." Responding to these incidents, Adams' propulsive music captures all the conflicting emotions with his characteristic insight. The Los Angeles Times said, "There should be no doubt that Girls of the Golden West is the most powerful Opera of the moment."



Beginning to play the accordion at age 7, John Torcello was a student of Al Cirrillo at Roxy's Music Store in Batavia, NY. His subsequent studies were with Joseph Robusto, an early proponent of the chromatic free bass instrument, who subsequently introduced John to the late, great jazz accordionist Russ Messina in Buffalo, NY.

It was under Messina's tutelage that John became the USA's ATG Champion in 1971 and 1972. He traveled to compete in the CIA Coupe Mondiale in Bruges, Belgium, where he earned 3rd Place, and then one year later, went on to win the coveted Coupe Mondiale World Accordion Championships held in Caracas, Venezuela. John later completed his undergraduate Music Composition degree at the University of Toronto, studying accordion with Joseph Macerollo.

John has enjoyed an accomplished career playing with orchestras including the Los Angeles Philharmonic, as well as for other important musical events. Career highlights include appearances with the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Los Angeles Philharmonic New Music Group, Pasadena Pops/Symphony, Pacific Symphony, Long Beach Opera, Jacaranda Music and Idyllwild Arts Orchestra under conductors including Michael Tilson Thomas, Simon Rattle, Zubin Mehta, Andreas Mitisek, Rachel Worby, Carl St. Clair, John Williams, Esa-Pekka Salonen, and Gustavo Dudamel in works by composers including DelTredici, Berg, Weill, Piaf, Golijov, Bernstein, Piazzolla, Shostakovitch, Dean, and Zappa.

Several of John Torcello's recordings have been re-released including: "TORCELLO Music of the Baroque," "TORCELLO State of the Art Accordion," and "Pastiche - John Torcello and Anthony Brazier (Flute)," all of which are available on Amazon.

New England Digital Accordion Orchestra

Where can a lover of music witness a musical ensemble consisting entirely of accordions, accompanied by two vocalists, a drummer, and guitarist that combines the sounds of nearly every instrument and a song list from nearly every genre on the planet into a single concert? The answer is in a concert performance of the New England Digital Accordion Orchestra, which has its roots in Western Massachusetts.

The orchestra is the first of its kind in the US and one of only two known in existence throughout the world, according to founder and conductor, AAA 2nd Vice President Sam Falcetti. "Close your eyes and you won't imagine that you are listening to a group consisting mostly of accordions," says Sam. The group, which performed recently at Chatham First Night on Cape Cod, uses Roland's digital V-Accordions.

The orchestra's repertoire ranges from Broadway show and Hollywood film tunes to country and rock 'n' roll and from Dixieland to polka classics. Formed in 2015 by Sam Falcetti, whose family founded and still runs the Falcetti Music stores, the orchestra currently features performers representing four of the six New England states. Along with First Night Chatham, the group has performed at the Eastern States Exposition and other regional fairs, as well as appeared as an opening act for Deanna Martin and Bobby Rydell at the Italian Festival in Enfield.



The recent First Night Chatham featured 70 entertainment acts from around the country. Videos of the performances can be viewed on YouTube and Facebook by searching for New England Digital Accordion Orchestra.

The Winter Congress and CIA 149th General Assembly of Delegates will be held in Paks, Hungary. The Winter Congress is being hosted by our CIA Voting Member "Az Ifjú Harmonikásokért" Alapítvány - "For the Young Accordionists" Foundation, President Olga Papp, March 3-5.

Hanzhi Wang (Accordion) and Steven Banks (Saxophone) in Concert

Accordionist Hanzhi Wang will be joined by Steven Banks on saxophone for a noontime concert on February 22, 2023 as part of the Young Artist Concert Series. This popular lunchtime series features an array of some of the most exciting young musicians performing today. These concerts will also be livestreamed.

The concert will feature the following program: George Frideric Handel, Recorder Sonata in G minor, HWV 360; Krzysztof Penderecki, Three Miniatures; J.S. Bach, Selections from Goldberg Variations, BWV 988; Martin Lohse, Autumn Rain and Winter's Tale; J.S. Bach, Partita for Flute in A minor, BWV 1013; Miko Baj Majkusiak, The Elements; and Astor Piazzolla, Milonga Del Angel.

Praised for her captivating stage presence and performances that are technically and musically masterful, the groundbreaking young musician Hanzhi Wang is the first accordionist to win a place on the roster of Young Concert Artists in its 58-year history, and her hour-long appearance on the 2,145th episode of New York WQXR's Young Artists Showcase marked the first appearance of a solo accordionist on the program.

First Prize Winner of the 2017 Young Concert Artists International Auditions, Ms. Wang's debut opened the Young Concert Artists Series in New York in The Peter Marino Concert at Zankel Hall at Carnegie Hall, and her Washington, DC debut opened the 40th Anniversary Young Concert Artists Series at the Kennedy Center, co-presented with Washington Performing Arts.

Ms. Wang won First Prize in the 40th Castelfidardo International Accordion Competition in Italy, has served on the jury for the Accordion Competition of Rome and Portugal's International Accordion Festival, and inspired the next generation of accordionists with lectures, performances, and master classes at the Manhattan School of Music, Royal Danish Academy of Music, Tianjin Music Conservatory, Beijing's Capital Normal University, Tilburg and Ghent Music Conservatories (Belgium), and the inaugural 2018 Nordaccordion Festival in Norway.

Ms. Wang earned her bachelor's degree at the China Central Conservatory of Music in Beijing, and her master's degree at the Royal Danish Academy of Music in Copenhagen as a student of Geir Draugsvol.

Hector Del Curto Performs on "Argentina, 1985" Soundtrack

Bandoneon artist Hector Del Curto has performed on the soundtrack for the Oscar-nominated film, "Argentina, 1985." He shares that he was very happy to have participated in this historic film by playing bandoneon on the score composed by Pedro Osuna. "Argentina, 1985" won a Golden Globe for Best Foreign Language Film, is nominated for an Academy Award for Best International Film, and has gained much attention for placing a critical period in the history of contemporary Argentina in center stage.

Directed by Santiago Mitre, "Argentina, 1985" depicts the Trial of the Juntas, the prosecution of Jorge Videla's dictatorship that exploited and oppressed the country from 1976 to 1981. The film plays out through the perspective of the case's chief prosecutor Julio César Strassera and his assistant Luis Moreno Ocampo, who worked unremittingly to bring justice to the crimes and human rights violations committed by Videla's regime. While "Argentina, 1985" creates a true-to-life portrait of the Trial of the Juntas, audiences may crave more background understanding of Videla's dictatorship and how it led to more than 30,000 estimated disappearances and deaths of Argentine citizens.

Composer Pedro Osuna is a composer of concert music and film and TV scores. He became the youngest Berklee

student to ever write music for an Academy Award-nominated film and later became the youngest person to ever work as orchestrator on a James Bond film. A composer from Spain based in Los Angeles, Pedro career has Osuna's described as "meteoric." His projects recent include "Argentina, 1985" (composer) and Simon West's blockbuster "The Legend Hunters" composer), and he collaborated with some of the most important composers of our time on projects like "Thor: Marvel's Love and Thunder" Pixar's and "Lightyear" (M. Giacchino), "007: No Time To Die" (H. Zimmer), and the Expo 2021 (A. R. Rahman).

After studying with Nadia Boulanger's student Isaiah Jackson and Bernstein's disciple Richard Danielpour, he quickly found his style and started to get commissioned by some of the most interesting artists and conductors of our time, including collaborations with multi-Grammy-winning Hila Plitmann, Sophia Bacelar, Pablo Sainz Villegas, Francisco Fullana, the JACK, Carpe Diem, Mivos, and Diotima Quartets, and maestro Mauricio Linari.

Héctor del Curto was born in Buenos Aires and began to study tango music at a young age, winning the Best Bandoneon under 25 when only 17 years old. Following that honor, he played with the late tango greats, Astor Piazzolla and Osvaldo Pugliese among many others. During this time, he played at the Kennedy Center and Carnegie Hall. In 2018, he won the Grammy Award for Best Latin Jazz Album for the album Jazz Tango as a member of the Pablo Ziegler Trio.

Based in New York, Hector Del Curto's recent engagements include a recorded performance of Piazzolla's bandoneon concerto "Aconcagua" with the Boston Symphony Orchestra and Maestro Thomas Wilkins, a performance of Piazzolla's "Four Seasons of Buenos Aires" with the Indianapolis Chamber Orchestra, and a performance with the Portland Symphony Orchestra, which included Del Curto's composition, "Paris to Cannes."
