Making Spirits Bright

The Dargaville Museum (New Zealand) proudly presented its 18th concert, "An Afternoon of Music with Kevin Friedrich and Friends" on December 3, 2023.

For this production, "Making Spirits Bright," the Lighthouse Function Centre performance venue attached to the museum was once again filled with people, music, and community friendship as the talented variety of performers delighted concertgoers with their musical and dance offerings.

Hosted by AAA Board of Director Kevin Friedrich, the concert featured both up-and-coming performers, some taking to the stage for the first time, through to seasoned professional artists and groups. In addition to Kevin, fellow accordionists included The North Shore Accordion Orchestra (NSAO), Lionel Reekie and Maurice Jones, with other performers rounding out the 40 strong cast, including: vocalists Anna Collins, Jone Yelcich, Take 6, Ruth & Hans de Man, Martin Rhodes, Rivertown Singers, Roslyn Gilmour and Alanah Jones; pianists Laura & Annie Carey, and Nolene Osbaldiston; dance students from the





Leah Newlove Kaipara Ballet and Ballroom dancers Karyn & Ken Inder; the Dargaville Tamburica Orchestra with guest appearances by Frosty the Snowman (Elizabeth Card), Rudolph (Ros Gilmour), and Santa himself.

Plans are already underway for the fundraising series to continue in 2024, with the concerts sure to fill the Lighthouse with more incredible music performed by an array of talented artists.

The Dargaville Museum hosts the only public accordion exhibition in the Southern Hemisphere, "Accordion Gems, A Master Collection of Accordions Through Time." Established and curated by Kevin Friedrich, the 140 instruments on display showcase the fascinating evolution of the instrument over its nearly 200-year history.

The 2024 ATG Festival is honoring Joan C. Sommers and celebrating her 90th birthday in Kansas City MO, July 23-27, 2024.

There are a number of special events including the ATG Festival Orchestra directed by Joan C. Sommers playing newly commissioned works by Gorka Hermosa (Spain) and Ian Watson (United Kingdom).

A superb array of international level performers will be showcased throughout the event, including Bridge and Wolak (Canada), Das Duo Kollektiv (Austria), Gorka Hermosa (Spain), Grayson Masefield (New Zealand), Mirco Patarini (CIA President - Italy), Stas Venglevski (USA), the UMKC Community Accordion Orchestra directed by Joan C. Sommers, and others.

A highlight of the festival will be a special competition for solo accordion: the 'ATG World Cup' offering a \$5,000 first prize and \$3,000 second prize.

Guy Klucevsek Releases "Hope Dies Last" Recording

After retiring from performing in late 2018, accordionist Guy Klucevsek has been busy composing, with the results being the release of his new CD, "Hope Dies Last." Much of the music for this new album, 17 of the 19 tracks, are heard here for the first time, including the premiere of his six-movement suite for Laurie McCants' multimedia piece, "Industrious Angels."

Available now from Starkland, the new digital-only release of Guy's music features pianist Jenny Lin, violinist Todd Reynolds, the Smudges (Jeff Gauthier, violin, Maggie Parkins, cello), and an avalanche of accordions played by Alan Bern, Bachtopus, Will Holshouser, Nathan Koci, and Guy himself, the works being presented as solos, duos, trios, and more.

The music varies from the simple, deeply moving "Dear Werner" and the hauntingly spare melody of "How Slow the Whistle Sang" to the wildly raucous clanging of a toy piano in "A Little Madness in the Spring" and the powerful blasts, from multiple, full-throated accordions, in "String of Garlands".

In this album, Guy continues his tradition of writing "the world's most abnormal 'normal' music" (Village Voice), wherein instantly appealing and seemingly simple pieces surreptitiously employ unusual and imaginative arrangements.

Guy Klucevsek (b. 1947) is a prolific composer and a world-renowned accordionist. In addition to composing over 150 works, he has also commissioned pieces from Mary Ellen Childs, William Duckworth, Aaron Jay Kernis, Jerome Kitzke, Alvin Lucier, Stephen Montague, Somei Satoh, Lois V. Vierk, and John Zorn.

Klucevsek has performed and/or recorded with Laurie Anderson, Alan Bern, Bang On A Can, Brave Combo, Anthony Braxton, Anthony Coleman, Dave Douglas, Renée Fleming, Bill Frisell, Rahim al Haj, Robin Holcomb, Teiji Ito, Phillip Johnston, Kepa Junkera, the Kronos Quartet, Natalie Merchant, Pauline Oliveros, Estelle Parsons, Present Music, Relâche, Todd Reynolds, and Zeitgeist. His performances have graced the Adelaide Festival, the Berlin Jazz Festival, Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Spoleto Festival USA, BAM Next Wave Festival, and the children's television show, "Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood."

Klucevsek is a recipient of the United States Artists Collins Fellowship, an unrestricted \$50,000 award given annually to "America's finest artists." His 1987 project, "Polka From the Fringe," a collection of polkas composed for Klucevsek by Fred Frith, Christian Marclay, David Mahler, Peter Garland, John King, Mary Jane Leach,

Elliott Sharp, Bobby Previte, Carl Finch, and others, toured worldwide and was released on two CDs by EVA. This project was named "Best Recordings of 1992" on WNYC's "New Sounds."

In 1996, Guy founded Accordion Tribe, an international ensemble of composer/accordionists. The ensemble toured internationally from 1996-2009, released three CDs on Intuition, and was the subject of Stefan Schwietert's award-winning documentary "Accordion film, Tribe: Music Travels." Klucevsek has composed the scores for dancetheater pieces by Karen Bamonte, Angela Caponigro, David Dorfman, Maureen Fleming, Hellmut Gottschild, Victoria Marks, Stuart Pimsler, Claire Porter, and Sandy Silva. He has also composed for pieces music-theater by McCants.

Bloomsburg Theatre Ensemble, Ping Chong, Dan Hurlin, and Laurie McCants.

As a soloist, leader, and co-leader, Klucevsek has released over 25 recordings on Starkland, Tzadik, Winter & Winter, Innova, Review, Intuition, CRI, Steinway and Sons, and XI. His Starkland recording, "Transylvanian Software," was cited by Stereo Review as a "Recording of Special Merit."

Guy can also be heard on John Williams' orchestral scores for the Steven Spielberg films "The Terminal," "Munich," "Indiana Jones and the Kingdom of the Crystal Skull," and "The Adventures of Tintin."

In 2020, Klucevsek published his first collection of accordion scores, "Vignettes: Short Pieces for Accordion." In 2022, he was honored with a 75th birthday celebration presented by Roulette in Brooklyn, and was commissioned to compose and arrange music for the international touring project "Little Amal Walks," which celebrates hope and solidarity for displaced people everywhere.

Thanks to the generosity of several people who have donated accordions to our school, we now have the largest accordion club in P.S. 203's history! We are proud of our 18 members this year."

The group is conducted by the school's music teacher, Linda Holcomb, with the assistance of community member and professional accordionist, "Papa Joe" DeClemente. Papa Joe inspires them to be better accordionists. Among the many things he does for them, he also fixes their accordions!

Linda said, "We enjoy performing for concerts and events in our school, and we love taking our show on the road, into our community. During December, the group played holiday songs at several locations. The students always come home from those trips so excited, having experienced how their music can really be a blessing to others."

The 9- and 10-year-olds from Bayside, Queens, who make up "The Squeeze Box 18" excitedly prepared for their holiday concerts. Their director, Linda Holcomb, is elated that this is the largest group the Oakland Gardens School (PS 203) has ever had! Linda shares, "We have 18 accordionists this year! It's all thanks to "Papa Joe" DeClemente, who has looked tirelessly for 12 bass accordions for us. In the past, we were lucky to have 12 working accordions, but this year, I am delighted that we are able to give 18 students the opportunity to learn this wonderful instrument!" There are so many students who want to be in the accordion club that there is now a waiting list.

P.S. 203Q, which which may be one of the only elementary schools in the five boroughs of New York City that has a student accordion band. The school started their accordion band 15 years ago. They meet once a week at the beginning of the school day to practice various songs that they will perform throughout the year.

"Papa Joe" volunteers his Monday mornings to help Mrs. Holcomb with the accordion club. "He is a huge asset to our program!" remarks Holcomb. "The children love him, and so far, he's been able to fix just about anything that a 9-year-old can break on an accordion!"

Mario Tacca & Mary Mancini Present their 29th Annual Christmas Concert

Mario Tacca and vocalist Mary Mancini presented their 29th annual Christmas Concert on December 15, 2023 at the Church of the Assumption in Peekskill, NY. The concert proudly featured the Hudson Valley Accordion Ensemble as they presented a delightful evening of nostalgic music of the Christmas season.

AAA Board of Director Mario Tacca was born in Italy. During his childhood, his family moved to the Alsace Lorraine region of France where he began his musical studies. This is where his love and desire to play the accordion began. An accomplished musician, Mario Tacca dazzles audiences across the US and around the world with his outstanding virtuosity and his exciting interpretations of international music, the classics, and pop. Internationally acclaimed vocalist Mary Mancini has been featured in the New York Times, the Forth Worth Star-Telegram, and the Journal News and has performed in a variety of venues around the world. Able to sing in eight different languages, she is adept at pop, show tunes, operatic arias, and sacred music and has received worldwide acclaim.



As a dynamic and popular performing duo, they have completed two concert tours of China. As guests of the China Ministry of Culture, they toured five cities in three weeks and performed with three symphony orchestras. Joining them on their tour was highly acclaimed Chinese tenor, Douglas Song. In addition to performing with the Symphony Orchestras, some of the most memorable moments included a performance held at the 1600-seat True Color Jazz Supper Club in the booming city of Shenzhen and in the 3500 -seat Golden Opera House.

Roland Digital Orchestra

Where can a lover of music witness a musical ensemble consisting entirely of accordions, accompanied by two vocalists, a drummer, and guitarist that combines the sounds of nearly every instrument and a song list from nearly every genre on the planet into a single concert?

The answer is in a concert performance of the New England Digital Accordion Orchestra, which has its roots in Western Massachusetts. The orchestra is the first of its kind in the US and one of only two known throughout the world, according to founder and conductor, AAA 2nd Vice President, Sam Falcetti, of Wilbraham, Massachusetts.

"Close your eyes and you won't imagine that you are listening to a group consisting mostly of accordions," says Falcetti. The group uses Roland digital V-Accordions. According to Falcetti, the instrument, which dates to 2004, "has been aptly described as 'an orchestra in a box,' and each accordion can perform the sound of multiple instruments playing at one time with tone and expression." The orchestra's repertoire ranges from Broadway show and Hollywood film tunes to country and rock 'n' roll, and from Dixieland to polka classics.

Formed in 2015 by Falcetti, whose family founded and still runs the Falcetti Music stores, the orchestra currently features performers representing five of the six New England states. The group has performed at the Eastern States Exposition and other regional fairs as well as appeared as an opening act for Deanna Martin and Bobby Rydell at the Italian Festival in Enfield.

The orchestra most recently performed at First Night Chatham, featuring 70 entertainment acts from around the country, on New Year's Eve in Chatham, Massachusetts. The group first performed there in 2019 and was



welcomed back again in 2022 following two years of event cancellation due to COVID. Videos of the performances can be viewed on YouTube and Facebook by searching "New England Digital Accordion Orchestra."

2024 Accordion Seminars - Dr. William Schimmel

2024 will mark the 30th anniversary year of the Accordion Seminars. More is better. This has been our philosophy for 30 years - and we're proud of it: Staggering Variety, Overflowing Ideas, Developed Ideas, Ideas in Process, Success, Failure, Encouragement, by Curator Dr William Schimmel.

We're not a Fringe Group. We never were. We put on our lab coats and get to work and so can you - virtually.
